Y Camp At Holland Cove Is A Very Popular Place

If one were to judge by the recent weather, summer camping should still be a long way off, but believe it or not, next week the Y.M.C.A. Camp at Holland Cove will soon be a scene of activity as a large group of girls from 8 to 10 years of age opens the season on July 2nd. This age group will make way for another group of girls ages 11 to 14 following that, the boys ages 8 to 14 will take over.

The Y.M.C.A. was among the originators of organized camping and has developed it to a point of popularity where it is now generally accepted that every boy and girl should have the opportunity of a camping experience.

Much has been said about the fact that camp life is good for building character in boys and girls, but very little, showing how they are helped by this experience. If you are a parent, you have a right to know some of the spiritual skills children can acquire at camp, as well as the athletic skills which makes their bodies robust and their minds alert.

The boys and girls live in cabins with a trained counselor to supervise the group. They clean their own beds and learn to put the good of the group before the desire of self. Children at camp learn not only to do their share of work, but are encouraged to do more than duty requires. Their religious life is enriched by evening prayers, grace before meals

and Sunday devotions. Then such spiritual values as humility, reverence, and awe on the wooded trail, in nature study and in mutual helpfulness required of them on hiking trips. No boy or girl ever leaves camp without advancing along this intangible highway towards good character.

Camp is a good place for them to have their first experience away from home. They learn to take a stand at camp for their beliefs and acquire a consideration for the beliefs of their fellows which is necessary towards good character.

A church service is held at the camp chapel every Sunday throughout camp. Roman Catholic campers are taken under camp leadership to Mass at the Roman Catholic church nearby. The menus are prepared by expert dieticians and will provide nourishing and delicious meals. A regular health inspection takes place every morning at camp and a well equipped first aid room is available for the treatment of minor cuts and bruises. Water supply is tested by the Department of Health before and during each camp.
