

### Former Islander Returns To Korea As Missionary

—Dr. Florence Murray who took her preliminary training at the O'Leary School when her father, Rev. Robert Murray was the minister of the then O'Leary Presbyterian (now United) Church for eleven years from 1910 to 1921, is returning to her beloved work as a medical missionary of the United Church in Korea.

The Canadian Red Cross have given Dr. Murray a generous donation of supplies to take back for which she is very grateful. At the present time, no women workers are allowed in Korea except medical doctors and nurses. Dr. Murray and another missionary, Miss Ada Sandell, will sail for Japan in September and unless there is some drastic change in the war situation, they are assured of permission to re-enter Korea.

On her furlough Dr. Murray spoke to a crowded congregation at the O'Leary United Church about conditions in Korea and made a marvellous impression on the capacity congregation. They unite in wishing her God's continued blessing as she returns to the work that is so very dear to her heart and work like her's is vitally necessary if we are ever to have real peace in this war-torn world.

Her aged parents, Rev. Robert and Mrs. Murray are still living and despite their very advanced age, enjoy fairly good health. Rev. Mr. Murray is in his nineties (90s). They live at Bedford, near Halifax.

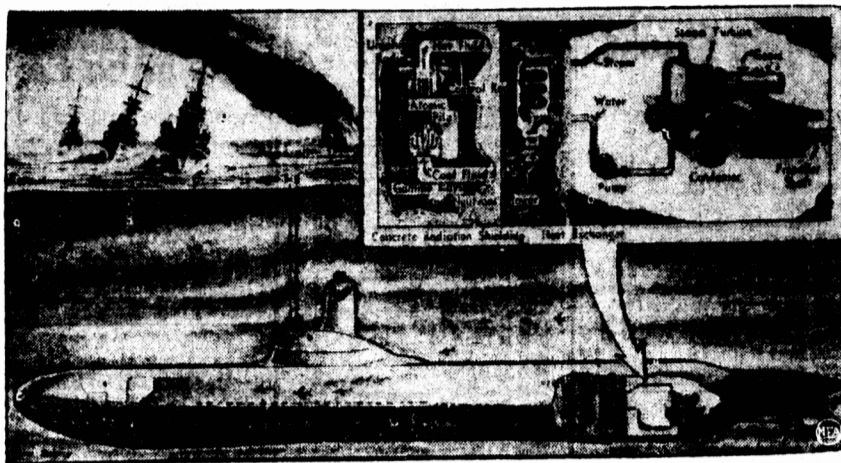

#### "WHERE THE SIDEWALK ENDS" EXPLOSIVE MELODRAMA

Exciting, suspenseful melodrama, exploding into first rate screen entertainment, is the measure of "Where The Sidewalk Ends," new film thriller which has its local debut at the Capitol Theatre today. The difficult, unique leading role of a member of New York's finest who disdances his calling but comes to redeem himself is superbly played by Dana Andrews. He is paired with the wistful Gene Tierney, expertly filling the part of a New York fashion model. "Where The Sidewalk Ends," with its authentic New York location scenes, that come across vividly on film, tells of Mark Dixon, criminal-hating, tough cop who in the course of an investigation accidentally kills a murder suspect. Realizing he has gone overboard in taking the guilt on innocence of a suspect into his own hands, Dixon becomes panicky and tries to utilize his inside knowledge of the workings of police method to twist the blame onto someone else. The way he resolves his dilemma makes for powerful film fare.

Though primarily this is Andrews' picture, Gene Tierney also has much opportunity to score as the model with whom he becomes romantically involved. She also has the advantage of wearing a number of her husband, Oleg Cassini's, fashion creations.

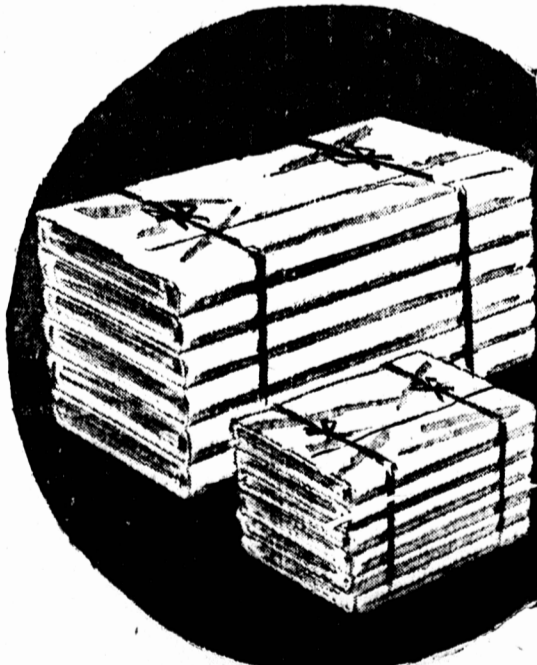
