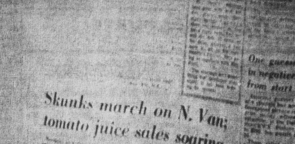

Telephone Call Causes Explosion

TAKELEY, England (Reuters) Someone made a telephone call here Wednesday, firemen believed, and accidentally blew up half the village. Firemen believed the call was from a man who had accumulated gas fumes in a nearby manure in this village northeast of London. The explosion, heard five minutes after a sheet of flame 60 feet into the air, damaged about 200 houses and injured at least six persons. One villager said: "I thought quite honestly that an atom bomb had been dropped in London."
