DAIRYING STATISTICS.—The North West Dairy Station was operated from May 13th, 1899 to November 10th, 1899. Milk was received from 113 patrons to the amount of 1,245,261 pounds from which 117,875 1/2 pounds of cheese were made. The amount of milk to make one pound of cheese was 10.56 pounds. The cheese was sold at 10.75c per pound. The value of milk per 100 pounds was 81 1/2 cents. An 8 per cent dividend was paid to shareholders.

The Stanley Bridge Butter Station was operated from November 8th, 1898 to January 27th, 1899. Milk was received from 44 patrons to the amount of 151,314 pounds from which 7191 lbs butter were made. The average per cent of fat was 4. The price realized averaged 17.87 cents. The value of butter fat per lb was 17 1/2 cents. The average value of milk was 70 cents per 100 pounds.

Sir C. Tupper has accepted an invitation to address a monster mass meeting to be held in Boston in March in aid of the British South African patriotic fund.

Mr. Byron N. Barns, who has been doing the western end of the province in the interests of Siroud & Son, Montreal, returned to Charlottetown this forenoon.

THE PROBS.—Southeast and south gales, westerly winds; weather turning colder by night.

THE TEMPERATURE.—The highest indicated during last night was 26 above zero. The highest today was 34 above.

SMELT FISHING.—The smelt fishing season will not be extended this year. Word to this effect has been received from the Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—There are said to be 200 Divisions of the Sons of Temperance in Nova Scotia with a total membership of 13,000.

ISLAND OFFICER'S APPOINTMENT.—An Ottawa despatch to the Halifax Herald, says: Lieutenant John A. MacDonald, 82nd battalion, is attached for duty to the 1st battalion of the Canadian mounted rifles for special service in South Africa. Upon arrival in South Africa this officer will be transferred to the 2nd (special service) battalion, Royal Canadian regiment, and will be absorbed, if a vacancy exists or is suitably created.

THE BELFAST DISTRICT.—There will be a meeting of the electors of the Belfast District in the Edon Hall on Saturday, Feb. 17th, at two o'clock in the afternoon. The meeting is called for the purpose of nominating candidates to contest the District at the next provincial election and for the transaction of other business of importance. A full attendance of the supporters of the Liberal-Conservatives of the District is desired.

COMMITTED TO THE EARTH.—The Ottawa Journal says: The remains of the late Mr. Wm. C. Desbrisay were interred in Notre Dame cemetery yesterday, the funeral taking place from his late residence, 80 Victoria street. Requiem service was held in St. Patrick's church by Rev. D. McNally, assisted by Rev. Father Fay as sub-deacon. The pall-bearers were A. Gobeil, deputy minister of public works; Joseph Plunkett, of the Privy Council office; John Gorman, J. W. Hughes, Hon. Senator Ferguson, D'Arcy McDonald, member of Parliament. Among friends present were Sir Louis Davies, minister of marine and fisheries; Senator Yeo, and Joseph Pope, under secretary of state. The floral tributes consisted of a cross from the staff of the Privy Council office; a cross from clerks in the public works department and an anchor from friends in the House of Commons.

## Local and Other Items.

EVIDENTLY ASTRAY.—Some of the crew of the Minto say that the ice in the straits is 22 feet thick. Twenty-two feet wide is probably what is meant.

CIVIC ELECTION.—The Civic Election will be held tomorrow. Voting will begin at nine o'clock and close as the Mayor Warburton and Councillors Lyons and Taylor have been elected by acclamation.

SHOOTING MATCH AT POWNAL.—The members of the Pownal Sporting Club intend having a shooting competition with the "Morris Tube" in Pownal Hall on Wednesday, Feb. 21st. A good prize list has been arranged. Members are requested to make an extra effort to attend.

HOCKEY.—Both teams are eager and ready for the fight and when the Crystals and Abegweits meet on Friday next to battle for the championship trophy it will be a fight to the finish as both are resolved to do or die. The result will be the greatest game ever witnessed on P. E. Island.

CASE OF APPENDICITIS.—A case of appendicitis developed yesterday at St. Dunstan's College, the patient being a student named Aselin, belonging to Rimouski. Dr. Conroy had the patient brought to the Charlottetown Hospital early in the evening, and at midnight he was operated upon. His early recovery is expected.

ISLANDER SPEAKS OUT.—An exchange says: "Prof. McVane, of Harvard University, speaking at Arlington the other day favored the English side. He said that the capitalists did not instigate the war but that it was brought about by the expressed grievances of the Outlanders. The court and jury system of the Boers was criticized by Prof. MacVane, who said that the Outlanders could obtain no justice in Transvaal courts. Mr. MacVane evidently does not humbug himself into the belief that the war is due to British capitalistic greed for gold and diamond mines." Professor MacVane is a Prince Edward Islander.

CITY COUNCIL.—The last regular meeting of the City Council as at present constituted was held last evening, Councillor Horne being the only absentee. A letter from Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C., claiming \$150 damages for Mrs. John Higgins, who fell on the sidewalk near Zion Church some time ago was laid over for the consideration of the incoming board. Four tenders for the city weigh scales were submitted, and that of James A. McLeod, for \$200, accepted. The Council was favorable to paying a bill due the McKinnon estate for goods supplied to the Water Commissioners during the construction of the waterworks, and the clerk was instructed to notify the commissioners to that effect. The claim is for work done by the late firm of McKinnon & McLean during the construction of the water works, in the year 1888, while Mr. McKinnon was a Water Commissioner. The Commissioner would not pay the claim while Mr. McKinnon held a seat at the board, and the claim was not pressed until two of the Commissioners were dead, and the third had left the Province. The board, as at present constituted, knows nothing whatever about the matter. Councillors Nicholson, Cooper, Taylor, Crabbe and Lyons spoke of the pleasant relations which had existed at the board during the term just closing, and expressed their desire that the incoming two years would pass as pleasantly. Mayor Warburton also spoke in a similar strain, and thanked the various members of the Board for courtesies extended.
