Phillies Still Tops

ONE OF the most surprising stories in major league baseball this season has been the success tale of the Philadelphia Phillies, currently riding the NL standings, just a little ahead of San Francisco Giants.

Without a single super-star, the Phillies have come up with balance in just about every department this season, and they've managed to win a good number of the close ones. Determination and team spirit has taken them a long way on the road to what could be their first crack at a world title since the White Kids of '50 won the National League pennant.

The Phillies finished a modest fourth last season. Their mark was 87.9 for 337. The big hits were supplied by Wes Covington (.303), Tony Gonzalez (.306) and John Callison (.284).

This year, the same three outfielders have taken turns leading the Phils to victory while a trio of relief pitchers have contributed to their success.

Top in the late innings bracket have been Dodger cast-off Ed Roebuck, Chris Short and Dallas Green. The team's leading starters have been Art Mahaffey, who has won all of his last six games, and Jim Buzard, both of whom beat the thundering New York Mets over the weekend.

Pennant favorites with many sportswriters, San Francisco, had a good weekend as they whipped Milwaukee 4-0 and Cincinnati 8-2. Willie Mays has kicked his slump and is hitting .365 and Jim Dwyer is just about the best either league has on the mound.

The Magdalen Races

A PERSON'S FIRST impression might be that Prince Edward Island is the smallest body of land in the North American continent that has horse racing. But that isn't the case.

We've received a letter from a sports fan in the Magdalen Islands, which tells that they have the lure of the track as well as P.E. Islanders.

He writes: "The people of the Magdalen Islands were always fond of horses and harness racing. But the only track was on the sand in the summer and on ice in winter. Once a race was so disrupted that it had to be settled on the ice, the race was cancelled. Two racetracks were built on the boat and transported to P.E.I., where they were raced in the presence of a good many people.

There are two tracks on the island, he writes, one at Etang-Du-Nord, owned by Avila Landry, and of one quarter mile distance. The other is an oval track, three-eighths mile-to-furms for three quarter mile, and located at House-Harbour. Sometimes in the fall, he writes, mile races are held there.

There are now about 20 race horses on the island; all imported from P.E.I. but for Mighty Torus, from Quebec this spring.

Track record for the 1/4 mile stretch are trot, 29 sec. by A.R. Mac, and pacer, 29.3 sec., by Queen Primrose and Cye Dick. The 3/8 mile mark of 1:47 is held by Sir Joseph, who also holds the mile mark of 2:27.
