

Health Minister Officially Opens Renovated Tyne Valley Hospital

TYNE VALLEY — "This is a tremendous development — it indicates the people of Tyne Valley are on the march," Premier Shaw told the large gathering at the official opening of the recently renovated and enlarged Stewart Memorial Centre here Saturday.

Premier Shaw was one of many speakers, including Hon. Hubert MacNeill, provincial minister of health, who cut the ribbon to officially open the centre.

Work on the centre, started in 1963, included a 49-foot extension to the present hospital which first opened its doors to patients 13 years ago, and completed renovations of the older section.

The cost of the project is in the vicinity of \$70,000 and the recently completed extension includes a pediatric unit, a central supply area, two private rooms, a self-contained unit containing a maternity ward with three beds; a delivery room and nursery; a completely self-contained isolation suite a minor surgical procedure room; an out-patient department containing x-ray equipment and dark room; a large laundry and kitchen; and a staff office accommodation for a public health nurse and living quarters for the staff.

Mother Angela of Alberta, the mother general of the Sisters of St. Martha; Dr. G.E. Robinson; Mrs. Bertha Lidstone, R.N., the centre's nursing supervisor, and Charles Yeo, St. Eleanor's, Rev. Delmont Yeo, Fort Hill, blessed the hospital with a prayer. Master of ceremonies for the opening was Stanley Maynard, chairman of the centre's board of directors.

With the recent renovation and extension, the centre, now a 13-bed institution, is valued in the vicinity of \$110,000. On the regular medical staff are Dr. G.E. Robinson of Tyne Valley, Dr. Raymond Reid of Wellington and Dr. Thomas Moore of Summerside.

In officially opening the hospital Saturday, Dr. MacNeill stated that the care and work being carried out at the centre was "equal to any in the province."

Other speakers included: Education Minister I.G. Dewar, M.O. who represents the area in the provincial legislature; R.A.

Furs Valued At \$28,000 Ruined During Ferry Trip

Some 67 fur garments valued at \$53,000 wholesale were ruined by salt water on the Carleton Place ferry crossing Saturday morning. Robert Turgeel of Carleton Place, told The Guardian last night.

Mrs. Turgeel said he was crossing on the Northumberland Ferry on Saturday morning and at about the middle of the strait a wave which crashed over the projecting doors of the ferry smashed out the front window of his Econoline van, filling the truck with salt water and ruining the pieces inside.

Mrs. Turgeel said he was in about the middle of the line of cars waiting for the boat but that the first cars were loaded in the sides and his van was pushed out the very front of the ship in the middle of the deck. A milk rancher told me that one salt water gets on the fur, that does it, they're ruined," Mrs. Turgeel noted, "and that is absolutely true."

He said the furs were an estimated \$28,000 value wholesale and \$50,000 retail. Also ruined by the salt water were Mr. Turgeel's personal camera and a radio.

He said "I was called down from the upper deck after the alarm system went off in the truck and I found the water running in and out of the truck with the motion of the ship."

He said the truck was damaged inside from the water and is now in a Charlottetown garage. The truck, with brakes locked and in gear was thrown backward into a car behind the truck, the main damage, however, was caused by the sea water.

When asked about insurance he said the furs were insured against fire and theft "but not this kind of accident."

He noted that when furs of any sort are shipped overseas they are wrapped in an oil paper and placed in large tight boxes to protect against sea water, but that the furs in his truck were open to it. "They are all completely ruined," he said.

Mrs. Turgeel obviously disturbed by the incident, said the wind was blowing about 35 to 40 miles per hour at the time with a very heavy sea, and that the ferry never should have sailed in such a storm.

He said it was gross negligence on the part of Northumberland and Ferries and he is holding them entirely responsible, regardless of what is on the back of the ticket issued for passage.

Mrs. Turgeel feels it is the company's fault for allowing a sailing on such a bad day.

Mrs. Turgeel has conferred with insurance agents and lawyers here about the incident and has postponed his departure until some settlement is reached.

He said without his stock he cannot carry on business because he sells directly to dealers and they set the final retail prices. The furs carried in the truck were destined for several Island fur dealers.

Captain Claude Hunter of Northumberland Ferries, when contacted last night said he had "no comment" about the incident.

Canadian Red Cross Supplies Aid Yugoslav Flood Victims

Canadian Red Cross emergency relief supplies and a cash gift totalling \$10,000 are on the way to Yugoslavia to assist flood victims in Zagreb according to information received by J. Gordon Macdonald, president of the P.E.I. Red Cross.

The League of Red Cross Societies in Geneva advised national Red Cross headquarters in Toronto that 14 cases of bedding and clothing produced by the volunteers of the Women's Work Committee throughout Canada have been rushed to the disaster area for distribution by the Yugoslav Red Cross. The shipment is valued at \$4,164.94.

This prompt assistance by the Canadian Red Cross to the victims in Europe and the Middle East is made possible through a system of stockpiling in Canadian production supplies in Canada warehouses in Zurich, Switzerland, and Lebanon.

Red Cross officials in northern Yugoslavia announced that help is needed for 40,000 victims in the Zagreb area. Another 160,000 people are menaced by rising floodwaters and there is fear of epidemics in the disaster zone.

Major General A. E. Winch, Red Cross national commissioner, said in Toronto that he is awaiting further information from a League of Red Cross liaison officer who has gone to Yugoslavia. He stated that additional Canadian Red Cross assistance will be forwarded if required.
