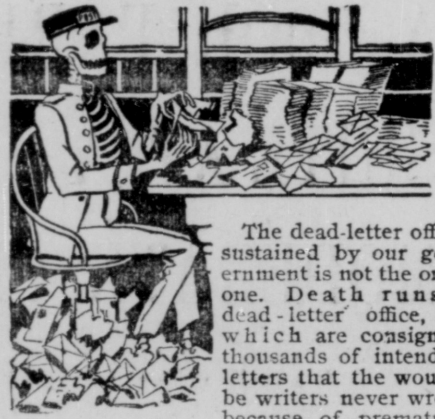

Strange Prophecies.
Clement V and Philip IV procured the condemnation of Molay, the grand master of the Templars, to the stake. As he was led to execution Molay cited his persecutors to appear before God's throne, the king within 40 weeks and the pope within 40 days. Within those respective times both died. Rienzi, the last of the tribunes, condemned to death Fra Moriale. When he had pronounced the sentence, the culprit summoned the judge to meet death himself within the month, and within the month Rienzi was assassinated.

In 1575 Nanning Koppezoen, a Roman Catholic, tortured to death during the religious strife in the Netherlands, recanted his extorted confession when on the way to the scaffold. A clergyman, Jurian Epezoen, tried to drown his voice by clamorous prayer. The victim summoned him to meet him within three days at the bar of God, and Epezoen went home and died within that time. While at the stake Wishart openly denounced Cardinal Beaton: "He shall be brought low, even to the ground, before the trees which have supplied these fagots have shed their leaves." The trees were but in the bravery of their May foliage when the bleeding body of the cardinal was hung by his murderers over the battlements of St. Andrews.—Chambers' Journal.

LATEST WAR NEWS.

THE QUEEN PLEASSED.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—The Queen, prior to leaving Osborne House this morning on her return to Windsor, inspected the Fourth Battery of Lincolnshire Militia.

The Queen announced that she was gratified that good news had been received from the front from the seat of war.

KILLED AND WOUNDED.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—The War Office announced that the following casualties among the British forces in the relief of Kimberley: Killed—Lieut. Baskth, Sixteenth Lancs; Lieut. W. McCulloch, Banbury Rifles.

Wounded—Capt. Gordon, Lieut. Brassey, Lieut. Cap. Mason, Sixteenth Lancs; Lieut. Fordyce and Long, of the second Division.

ROBERTS' REPORTS.

LONDON, Feb. 21.—The War Office has issued a despatch from Lord Roberts the main importance of which lies in the fact that it is dated, Paardeberg, 7.05 p.m. on Monday.

Paardeberg is 30 miles east of Jacobsdale.

The despatch announces that the railway to Kimberley is open and that General Methuen will proceed there with a reinforcement forthwith and that large supplies will be forwarded to the town.

HOW KIMBERLEY WAS RELIEVED
MODDER RIVER, Feb. 19.—Although the rapid march of General French's division was marked by a number of conflicts, his detail entry into Kimberley was unopposed.

When the British were still eight miles off the signalling corps intercepted a heliograph message from the beleaguered garrison to the Modder River saying "the Boers are shelling the town."

The advancing column replied: "This is General French coming to the relief of Kimberley." The garrison was incredulous, and thought the message was a Boer ruse, and flashed query: "What regiment are you?" The reply satisfied the defenders of Kimberley that the anxiously-awaited succor was at hand and a few hours later General French at the head of a column made a triumphant entry into the place, the people surrounding the troops and intermingling with them.

LATEST COLENSO TAKEN.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—News has been received that General Hart has occupied Colenso after a slight engagement.

LONDON, Feb. 21.—The following despatch has been received at the War Office from General Buller: Blows Farm, Tuesday, 4.10 p. m. The Fusilier brigade, yesterday, took Hlangwano hill, the right of the enemy's position and commanding Colenso.

The rest of the force advancing toward the Tugela this morning the enemy had withdrawn all their troops north of the Tugela and had practically evacuated Colenso.

Today General Hart occupied Colenso after a very slight resistance by a weak rear guard and we hold the line of the Tugela on the south side from Colenso to Eagles Nest.

The enemy seem to be in full retreat and apparently are only holding the position they occupy across the Colenso-Ladysmith railway, where it is close to an angle of the Tugela with a weak rear guard.

General Hart's advanced guard is crossing the river at Colenso.

Our casualties, yesterday and today, have I hope, been but few.
