At the same time the Board will doubtless decide what policy and activities it may be expedient to follow in view of the changed conditions since the outbreak of the war.

New Canadian Minister To Washington

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—(CP)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King announced tonight that Loring Christie, veteran member of the Civil Service and member of the External Affairs Department since 1913, has been appointed Canadian Minister to Washington, succeeding Sir Herbert Marier, who resigned because of ill health.

Born in Amherst, N. S., 52 years ago, Mr. Christie was educated at Nova Scotia public schools and Acadia University before taking up legal studies at Harvard University Law School. He returned to Canada and was called to the Nova Scotia Bar in 1913. He was appointed Legal Advisor to the Department of External Affairs here, and throughout the first Great War was closely associated with Sir Robert Laird Borden, Canada's Wartime Prime Minister. He attended the imperial war conferences, the peace conference in Paris, the Washington conference on limitation of armaments in 1921-22 when he was for a time secretary of the British Empire delegation.

In 1923, Mr. Christie resigned from the External Affairs Department and for 12 years was engaged in financial and legal work in London, England; Toronto and Montreal. He returned to his old post in the external affairs department in 1935 as counsel.

Mr. Christie becomes the fourth Canadian to go to Washington as His Majesty's Envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary. Hon. Vincent Massey, present High Commissioner in London, was first Canadian Minister to Washington, remaining there from 1927 to 1930. Hon. W. D. Heverson was appointed to succeed him in 1931 and resigned in 1935. Sir Herbert Marier was appointed in 1936.

Long Range Agricultural Plans Considered

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—(CP)—A Survey of production and marketing trends of Canada's agricultural industry is the first general study to be taken by the new Agricultural Supplies Committee, composed of heads of Agriculture Department Branches, announced this week by the Government.

While the first duty of that committee is to see that normal needs of the home market are supplied as usual, despite war conditions, it is also laying the groundwork now for meeting requests from the United Kingdom and France for food supplies. No such specific requests have been received as yet, it is understood, but are expected soon and will be the basis of new long range plans.

Meanwhile, immediate problems, which have arisen regarding certain commodities as a result of the war, are being thrashed out by the committee and representatives of producers and shippers. Cheese, apples and bacon, for example are suffering severely at the moment from sudden slump in their United Kingdom market.

Canada sells half its apple crop in the Old Country (Nova Scotia sells about 75 per cent of its crop there) and a current conference here is studying substitute ways of disposing of a large crop.

Little cheese has been sold on the cheese boards for 10 days because of loss of the British Market. That was lost by an accumulation of factors. First, retail prices were pegged by the British Government at the present low level; then British Exchange declined in terms of Can-

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—The appointment of Claude Melancon of Montreal to act as joint press censor for Canada with L. Clare Mover was announced tonight by W. S. Thompson, director of censorship. Mr. Melancon, formerly chief Ottawa correspondent of La Presse (Montreal), and also past secretary of the parliamentary press gallery here, is well known as a journalist and author, and has been honored with an academic award by the French Government for his work. He has been for some years chief of press services, Canadian National Railways.
