More Honors.

BALTIMORE, M. D., June 24. Harold Jackson, Danish Consul at this port, presented to-day to Captain Murrill, of the steamship Missouri, the insignia of the Danish knighthood, by order of the King of Denmark, in recognition of his services in saving the passengers and crew of the steamship Danmark. In acknowledging the honor, Capt. Murrill mentioned that Lord Salisbury, in a communication to him, said the British Crown would not grant permission to him to wear it, but by way of postscript Salisbury added there was no penalty for doing so. A number of Danish residents of Baltimore, Washington and New York presented Captain Murrill with an immense oil painting of the scene of the transfer of the passengers and crew from the sinking steamer Danmark. On the deck of the Missouri was an engraved copy of the resolutions passed by the House of Representatives and sent to Captain Murrill.

Nova Scotia News Notes.

HALIFAX, June 24. The Methodist Conference, by a vote of 46 to 11, condemned the Jesuits Estates Act.

Rev. Dr. Partridge, Rector of St. George's, has been appointed a canon of St. Luke's Cathedral.

Hattie Conrad, aged 19, blew her brains out at Lawrence town, N. S., yesterday afternoon. Her body was found at midnight in a clump of bushes near her parents house. She shot herself through the mouth, and the back of her head was shot to a jelly.

Austen Kennedy DeBlois, of Wolfville, N. S., who has just been made Doctor of Philosophy from Brown University, is the youngest Doctor of Philosophy in the world. Dr. DeBlois is the first man upon whom Brown University ever conferred the degree.

Douglas Sladen, the Australian poet, is in Halifax.

Imperial Federation.

TORONTO, June 24. The following is the special to the Globe to-day:—"At the Imperial Federation League meeting to-night, Sir Charles Tupper, after admitting that the federation movement was now received in Canada with as much enthusiasm as in some other quarters, suggested holding a convention, representing all parts of the empire, to consider the question of federation in all its bearings. He urged that one result might possibly be the adoption of an imperial fiscal policy that would benefit all the empire as a whole. Lord Herschell, the chairman, in the course of his speech remarked that if such a convention were held, it must be at the desire of the colonies. Mr. Rankin, M. P. for Leominster, urged Canada to take the lead in pressing for a convention, as suggested by Sir Charles Tupper."

Arrested For Embezzlement.

KINGSTON, Ont., June 24. Rev. R. T. Burns, Anglican Minister and Deputy Postmaster, was arrested this morning for embezzling Her Majesty's money to the amount of \$3822. In October, 1888, Elizabeth Love, of Mountain Grove, deposited \$389 in the Savings Bank and had a book issued to her for the amount in three sums, \$7, \$300 and \$82. The sum of \$7 was alone forwarded to the Savings Department, Ottawa. On June 14th, Mrs. Love came to the city to secure \$50. The money was asked from Ottawa, and the statement came back that only \$7 stood to her credit. Burns was off on his holidays, and when he returned to the office his arrest followed.

Ottawa News Notes.

OTTAWA, June 24. A collection of interesting economic and ornamental shrubs and plants has been received at the Experimental Farm during the past week. They are intended more especially as instructive stock for the seed testing house, and consist of such plants as tea, coffee, pepper and different spices. The Department of Agriculture is advised that three hundred Icelanders are en route to Canada. Mr. Justice Strong has declined to accept the position of Principal of Toronto Law School. Mr. Sedgewick, Deputy Minister of Justice, says intelligence of the projected mutiny by Kingston convicts came from one of the men friendly to the warden.

All Well.

MONTREAL, June 24. Sir John Thompson and Lady Thompson arrived here to-day, and the Minister at once proceeded to St. Vincent de Paul to inspect the Provincial Penitentiary there. The hon. gentleman reports everything in a satisfactory condition.

Boston Markets.

BOSTON, June 20.

EGGS.—Receipts for the week 112 boxes, 188 bbls., 12,779 cases; last week, 438 boxes, 115 bbls., 11,869 cases. There has been a steady demand and receipts keep pretty closely sold up at full previous prices. Eastern extras are still scarce. Best Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and P. E. Island lots firm at 15c. Michigan extras in good demand at 15c., with other western at 14 to 15c. as to grade.

POTATOES.—Receipts of old potatoes past six days 54,000 bush; previous six days 56,000 bush. The market has been very dull for the past three days. Burbanks are in large supply, and have a slow sale at 45 to 48c. for most lots, and have to be very extra to bring anything more. Chenango goes dull at 55 to 60c. Receipts of new potatoes are increasing, and they are now coming in considerable quantity from Norfolk. The next boat, due to-day, has 800 bbls. Prices have been well sustained so far, but with increased arrivals will probably rule lower soon.

FISH.—Mackerel are still nominal with almost none arrived here. About 25 bbls were loaded at Gloucester on Tuesday, which sold at \$15. Some little business doing in canned fish.
