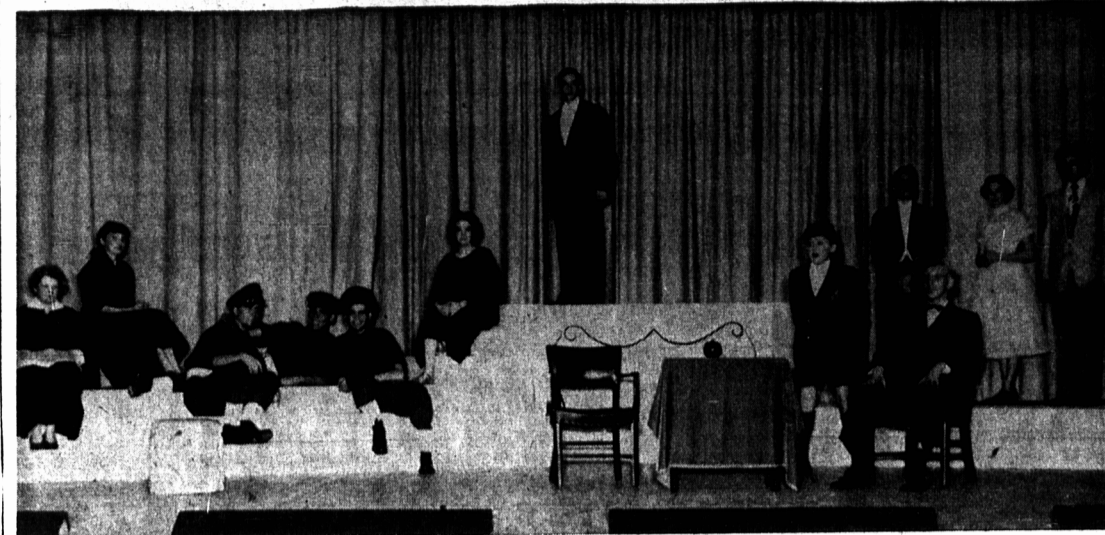
ETHEL M. INMAN

"Antigone" Presented In Regional Drama Contest

"Antigone", the second and final play submitted in the Prince Edward Island Regional Drama Festival of the Dominion Drama Festival was witnessed by another near capacity audience in the Auditorium of Queen Charlotte High School, Charlottetown, on Saturday night.

The presentation, which was adjudicated by Mr. Andre Van Gysegem, British actor, producer and lecturer, was by Saint Dunstan's Dramatic Society under the direction of Rev. Adrien Arsenault.

"Antigone" is the version by Jean Anouilh of Sophocles' tragedy which he wrote for the Athenian theatre public of the year 440 B.C., adapted by Lewis Galantieri. The new version is described as more realistic, more down-to-earth, much less religious in tone, but always noble. Dramatic critics say the play's outline has secularized Sophocles' masterpiece.

The presentation of "Antigone" was under the distinguished patronage of His Honour Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse and Mrs. Prowse, Hon. A. W. Matheson, Premier and Mrs. Matheson, His Worship, Mayor J. David Stewart and Mrs. Stewart.

Commenting on the presentation of "Antigone", the adjudicator said: "This has been my most difficult job thus far. The original was a very fine piece. In modernizing it, great attention should be paid to the people of Paris and France saw in it a symbol of freedom. The actors throughout should show emergency, energy and aggression, with freedom as their ideal. Say, do and act with the thought."

The adjudicator found ground for criticism in the pace and dramatic buildup and in the manner in which the emotions of Antigone were shown. Touching on the stage setting, he said he liked the adaptation of the rostrum, the flaming colour and the use of space dramatically. The three guards did quite well, as they personified power and military might. A carelessness in dictation and a tendency to drop his voice was observed in the performance of Chorus. "The love scene by Haemon was done quite well," he said. "More power and ruthlessness in the magnificent scene when Creon is using every endeavour to break the will of Antigone, would increase the tenseness of the situation."

In conclusion the adjudicator said: "I am disappointed that there are not more than two plays to deal with, possibly the faults spoken of are due to the plays being too difficult." "None had mastered the art of dialogue nor emotional possibilities of the play. Perhaps the performers are too young."

Health Week In Ch'town Schools

National Health Week, January 30-February 5, which is sponsored by the Health League of Canada, will be featured in the city schools by the showing of health films and by special activities designed to teach that "It is better to STAY WELL than to Get Well" which is the slogan for Health Week this year.

The annual immunization clinics arranged by Miss Bessie Beer, public health nurse for Charlottetown, will be held to give the important re-inoculating inoculation against diphtheria (needed every three years) to the pupils of Grades IV, VII and X. This year the pupils in Grade I will be given protection against both diphtheria and tetanus if they had originally received the "triple" protection against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus when younger. Health officials state that continuation of inoculations against whooping cough is unnecessary after commencing school as the dangerous age for whooping cough is during infancy and up to two years.

The opportunity to be re-vaccinated against smallpox will be offered to the pupils of Grade VIII. This is recommended to be repeated every five to seven years.

Cibus and organizations which hold meetings during this week have planned programmes featuring health topics or discussions on maintaining personal and community health.

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Planes To Scatter Feed Over PEI For Game Birds

An errand of mercy mission will take two planes on a zig-zag course over P. E. Island today as they scatter several tons of feed in an endeavour to cut the death losses of Hungarian partridge through starvation.

An emergent meeting of Queen's County Fish and Game Association yesterday in Charlottetown and a similar meeting by the Prince County branch in Summerside on Saturday resulted in arrangements being made for the distribution of feed for the starving game birds by airplane.

Derrill Stanton will take off from Charlottetown with two tons of Government inspected barley feed mixed with an equal quantity of sand which will be scattered over chosen areas of Queen's and King's counties. The same general program will be carried out over Prince County from Summerside.

Mr. Tam Gillies, president of Queen's County Association, who presided at yesterday's meeting urged that farmers throughout the province lay bare a suitable spot near their homes where feed may be regularly scattered in a gritty

place in order to carry the Hungarians through the critical present and weeks which lie ahead. "This is something which the school children can do with little or no difficulty, which will be of great value to the province and deepen their interest in wild life."

Our association will be glad to make suggestions and help the young folk in this work if they write us, Mr. Gillies said.

Grants To Three Universities

NEW YORK (CP)—The Carnegie Foundation of New York Sunday announced grants totalling \$200,000 to three Canadian universities.

A \$130,000 grant was made to Laval University in Quebec for social science research on the problems of industrial Quebec.

Memorial University, St. John's Nfld., receives \$50,000 for research on the province and Queen's University, Kingston, Ont., gets \$20,000 for a biochemical research project.

Furthering research into "underdeveloped areas" of education, the foundation also gave \$300,000 to Duke University, Durham, N.C., for a five year research project on the development of the British Commonwealth.
