MONDAY

Dr. Albert Sinclair, 27-year-old son of Mrs. Sinclair and the late Mr. Peter Sinclair, M.P., has been awarded the Prince Edward Island I.O.D.E. overseas scholarship of \$2,000 which is said to be the largest provincial scholarship awarded in this province.

This announcement was made last evening by Mrs. Thane A. Campbell, provincial educational secretary of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire (I.O.D.E.) who said that four excellent applications, all with very close qualifications, were considered in making the selection.

Dr. Sinclair is presently doing post graduate work at the Vancouver General Hospital in Vancouver, B. C.

Master Dale MacLeod, three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wallace MacLeod, Duke Street, Summerside, received a painful injury on Friday afternoon when the high chair in which he was sitting tipped forward towards the stove. His mother, in an attempt to prevent him from falling on to the stove, barely managed to reach the chair and put it aside. The chair and occupant fell at an angle, missed the stove, but hit the full young lad somehow came in contact with a nail which entered his neck under the chin, inflicting a nasty throat wound.

He was rushed to the Medical Center for first aid and on the arrival of his father from the Prince County Hospital where several stitches were taken. It was learned over the week end that his condition was satisfactory and all wish the young lad a speedy recovery from the effects of his accident.

At their meeting in Federation Office on February 6, the executive of the Teachers' Federation drew up tentative plans for a Teachers' Aid Service, to be inaugurated this fall. Should this plan be approved by the Board of Governors, teachers will be given assistance with lesson plans and helps, professional education, and ready references to sources of information. A director of Teachers' Aid will be chosen to supervise the whole scheme.

Recently the fund for maintaining the old Protestant Cemetery on Elm Avenue received a contribution. It came in the form of a cheque from Mr. Paul R. Brecken of Calgary, a son of the late Rev. Ralph Brecken, D.L., a native Islander who had many members of his family buried in the cemetery.

Although it has been closed to burials since 1872 and kept up since then by contributions from the various Protestant churches of the city, the secretary of the board of trustees of the cemetery noticed the name of Brecken recurring on many of the tomb stones. Because of this information regarding them was sent to the Calgary member of the family.

Four cases of clothing, each weighing about 100 pounds, for disaster victims in Holland, were taken on board the regular Maritime Central Airways flight to Moncton on Sunday morning. Mrs. E. A. Foster, Chairman of the Red Cross Women's Work Committee for P.E.I. was on hand to see them off. Maritime Central Airways, which renders such outstanding service to the Red Cross all the year round by transporting blood free of charge, co-operated again by delivering these four cases without cost to T. C. A. at Moncton. From Moncton they go on to Dorval, P. Q. by T. C. A. and from Dorval by the Dutch Air Lines to Amsterdam, all free of any charge.

Past skating Muckle Hollett, sweeping in from the right wing side, converted Billy Gould's 40-foot pass after five minutes and seventeen seconds of sudden-death overtime here Saturday night to give the Halifax Atlantics a hard won 3-2 victory over the Charlottetown Islanders.

The hard working Hollett, who is the smallest player in the M.M.H.L., swept Gould's shot into the Islanders' cage in one motion as he tripped the pass and flipped the puck into the top part of the net over a prostrate Al Millar.

TUESDAY

OTTAWA (Special). Discussions between representatives of Northern Maritime Ferries and the Canadian Maritime Commission on extension of the ferry services between Wood Islands and Caribou, N.S. are expected to open here tomorrow morning. Subsequent to Transport Minister Chevrier's announcement last month that a new vessel would be built to meet increasing freight and passenger demand, plans are being made both for interim additional accommodation on the run and long-term ferry operation.

An interesting address on Television was given at the Charlottetown Rotary Club luncheon yesterday by Lt. Col. K. S. Rogers, president of the Island Radio Broadcasting Company, who stressed the present difficulties and cost of transmission service. "I think that in due time Charlottetown will be able to receive television, and that television may be from a transmitter in or close to Charlottetown," he added. If this is to be brought about, however, Charlottetown capital will, of necessity, have to be employed and in no small amount.

Mr. Ernest Lord and Mr. Harry Hennessey were re-elected Commissioners for the Village of Parkdale for three year terms at the annual meeting of electors held in Parkdale Hall recently.

Mr. Edwin Cook, chairman of the Board of Commissioners, presided. Mr. Fred Driscoll was nominated for Commissioner but declined. Reports presented included those of the Street and Sidewalks Committee by Mr. Henry Douglas; Water by Mr. E. Lord; Mail by Mr. H. Hennessey; and Finance by Mr. Maurice McAler. Matters of principal interest discussed included the water supply, the policing of St. Peter's Road and the street lights. It was agreed that the Commissioners would obtain reports on these items and present them at a later meeting.

\*A seal was discovered Sunday at Iona, a locality over three miles from tidal water. It was found in the churchyard by residents on their way from church service, and is presently being cared for by Mr. Charles MacGulgan.

It is thought that the seal made its way up Pinetie River, southerly from the head of the stream, which emerges about a mile from Iona, and thence made its way to the village. The residents of the community are at a loss as to just what should be done with it, but it is certain that during its stay there it will be well cared for.

\*The summer home of Mr. Herman Lawson at Mitchell River was completely destroyed by fire of an unknown origin yesterday. The house has been vacant since early fall. Mr. and Mrs. Lawson having returned to Chicago.

The fire was noticed by Mr. Arthur MacDonald, who spread the alarm. However, before any assistance could be gathered, the building was a complete loss. Included in the loss is a large amount of fine furniture and household appliances.

High wind accompanied by rain and sleet caused considerable damage to telephone and telegraph lines in Western Prince County Sunday night. All long distance telephone lines were out of order with linemen effecting repairs to one line on Summerside yesterday afternoon. Damage in most cases was caused by icing and trees falling across the lines. There was no interruption of electric power service except for one hour yesterday afternoon while a pole at Northam was being replaced.

It is expected that it will be several days before services will be restored to normal.—FW.

Four places of business in Alberton were broken into over the week-end, all four breaks being made through windows which were broken.

Barbour's Service Station and Foley's Store each reported the loss of sums of money, and in the case of Foley's store possibly some goods removed from the shelves. White's store and Mac's Taxi were broken into but no definite losses were reported in either case. The owner of the taxi stand is presently in Halifax.

WEDNESDAY

At a meeting of the P. E. Island Potato Marketing Board held yesterday afternoon, it was decided to readjust minimum price levels on tablestock potatoes and some varieties of seed, with the exception of Irish Cobbler seed which will remain at \$3.25 per hundred, at the farm.

The new tablestock prices issued last night will be \$1.35 per 75 pound bulk at the farm in the inner railway zone and \$1.30 in the outer railway zone.

THURSDAY

Mr. George W. Ayers was elected President of the P. E. I. Agricultural Council at the concluding session of their two day programme which terminated yesterday afternoon.

A number of important resolutions were passed including the recommendation that during the coming year an educational programme be launched to enable the buying public to become better acquainted with the several different product grades and varieties. A more demanding public will serve to encourage the better classification of products in the retail stores, according to the opinion freely expressed during the discussion on this matter.

Another resolution of far-reaching importance was adopted which called for Messrs. David Pencock

\*Fire last evening completely destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Stewart Adams at Victoria Cross. It is believed that the fire started from a stove thought to be out, and spread from the kitchen throughout the house in a few minutes.

It is understood that Mr. Adams now residing at Charlottetown, had come to his home at Victoria Cross to take his furniture to Charlottetown. Before leaving he extinguished the fire in the stove, but it would appear that it blazed up again sometime after his departure. The fire was first noticed by neighbors, and although many gathered they were unable to save anything owing to the rapid progress of the blaze.

OTTAWA (CP)—Government house today announced the names of 32 prominent Canadians who have been asked to serve on the Canadian national European flood relief committee of which the governor-general is chairman.

Prime Minister St. Laurent heads the list which includes the premiers of the 10 provinces; George Drew, Progressive Conservative leader; Justice Minister J. G. Bennett; and Gen. H. D. G. Crerar and chief justice W. R. Martin of Saskatchewan.

Others include Hugh Mackay, Saint John, N. B.; R. P. Bell, Halifax; Allan Holman, Summerside, P. E. I.; and Chesley A. Rippey, St. John's, Nfld.

The first meeting of the new Town Council at Kensington was held on Monday evening when Mayor W. H. Profit and five councillors took the oath of office before Town Magistrate J. P. Profit. SYDNEY (CP)—Sydney Millionaires whipped Charlottetown Islanders 8-5 Tuesday for their first home victory in a month of play in the Maritime Major Hockey League.

With forward Chuck Holdaway replacing the suspended Al Millar in the Islanders' goal, the Millionaires broke into an early goal-scoring stride that never faltered. Freddy Hildebrand rifled in two goals late in the third period after the Islanders tied the score at 3-3.

The E. Frank Acorn rink of Charlottetown came from behind to defeat the G. J. Hayes rink of Summerside 10-8 last night and take over the leadership in the play for the Provincial championship in the Confederation Bouspiel at the Charlottetown Curling Club.

As a result of their victory the Acorn rink are the only team undefeated in the competition for the British Consols Trophy. They have three wins in three games.

OTTAWA, Feb. 12.—(Special)—A complete summary of the annual catches of fish in Prince Edward

Island, both by species and value, is giving about fifty Charlottetown women employment at the Royal Packing Plant in Charlottetown. The women are hulling strawberries which have been held in the government cold storage plant since last July, for the Strawberry Growers' Association. With sugar added, the berries, after hulling are being packed in 22 pound pails for return to freezing temperature in cold storage. There are fifty tons of the berries to be handled, and it is expected that the work will last a month.

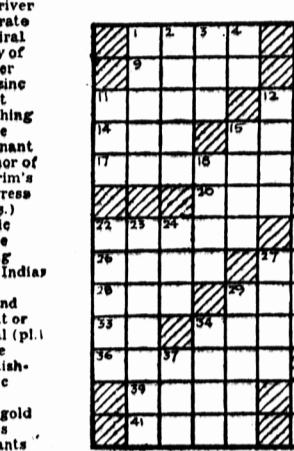
