Newport Man Pleads Not Guilty To Shooting

GEORGETOWN — John Francis MacLellan, Newport appeared before Kings County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, at Georgetown yesterday charged with causing bodily harm to Harold Campbell, Newport by shooting him with a 12-gauge shot gun.

The incident is alleged to have taken place at Newport on Sunday, June 17. MacLellan who is represented by G. R. Foster, QC, pleaded not guilty and his case was adjourned to Aug. 8. The accused has been free on bail since shortly after the alleged incident.

Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGuigan represented the Crown in this case and in all cases on the docket.

Ronald Joseph MacDonald, Cardigan, appeared charged with possession of an offensive weapon—a .22-0600 rifle for a purpose dangerous to the public. The accused who is represented by Mr. Foster, elected trial judge without a jury and his case was adjourned to Charlottetown on July 9 when a date will be set for the holding of a preliminary hearing.

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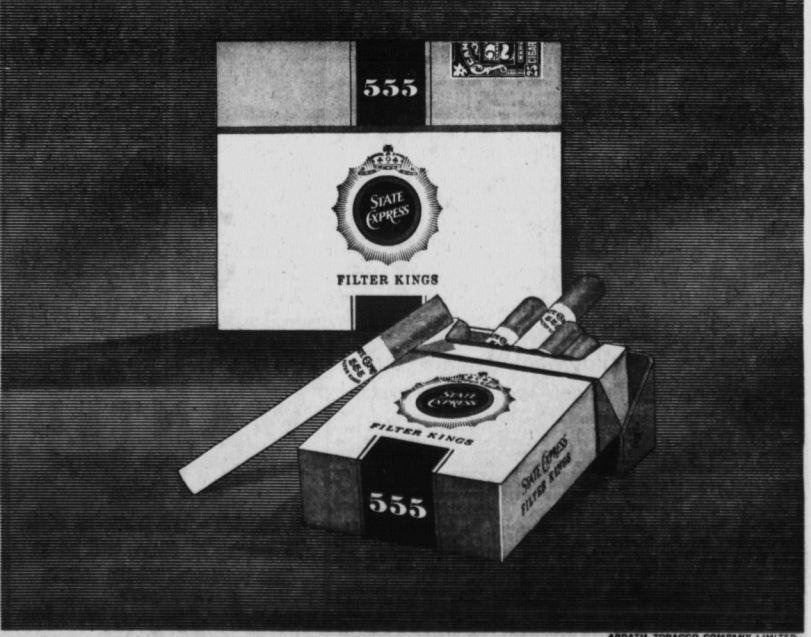
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
