### Present Brief On Shipping

HALIFAX (CP) — The Maritime Marine Workers Federation (CCL), in a brief presented to the royal commission on coastal shipping, calls for legislation restricting coastal trade to ships built and registered in Canada. The brief said "it is in the national interest of Canada and in future development of one of her basic industries that the flow of Canada's goods not be dependent on foreign carriers." The brief also urged construction on the Chignecto canal as a means of encouraging greater shipping activity along the east coast. It said a canal through the isthmus joining New Brunswick and Nova Scotia "will greatly encourage water transportation of agriculture, fisheries, forest and mineral resources of the Maritime provinces."
