

Islanders Tied With Miners After 4-2 Win Over Glace Bay At Forum

Backed by the spectacular third period goaltending of Roger Bessette and the fine offensive play of the Laliberte, Sandon, Carver line the Charlottetown Islanders moved into a third place tie in the M.M.H.L. by defeating the Glace Bay Miners 4-2 at the Forum last night before one of the largest crowds of the season.

Bessette, the winner of the Calder Trophy in the Quebec League two years ago for his outstanding play, made 14 big stops during the final twenty minutes and four of them were on break-aways by Bobby Brown, Jim Farrell, Kevin Rochford and Johnny Lumley.

Winger Orrin Carver, the fast skating Charlottetown forward, sparked the Islanders attack as he figured in every goal. Centreman Spike Laliberte, playing his best game as an Islander, and winger Paul Sandon each had three points.

Laliberte, Carver and Sandon each shot a goal. The other goal was scored by defenseman Bob Gray on a smart play with Sandon and Carver. Gray also set up the Islanders second counter.

The Miners got their goals in the first period with wingers Bobby Brown and Johnny Lumley being the marksmen.

The game, one of the fastest to be played here this winter, was cleaner than Friday night's encounter between the same two teams. Tempers flared a bit in the third period and Larry Blackburn and Bobby Brown drew penalties for a roughing, high sticking duel near the end of the game.

The win was the third for the Islanders in their last three starts. They have 58 points, the same number as the Miners.

The Islanders playing coach Wes Trainer guided his team from the bench as the result of a facial injury received here Friday. The Miners were without Art Treen, Kenny Watson and Tommy Fyles. Copper Leyte, who usually plays forward, teamed up with Hughie Campbell on defense.

The Islanders had a big edge in the first period, outshooting the Miners 18-5. However, Cliff Hicks had a spectacular period and came up with a number of near impossible saves off the pressing Islanders.

The Islanders also had an edge in the second period and the Miners led by Farrell and Myles took over in the third.

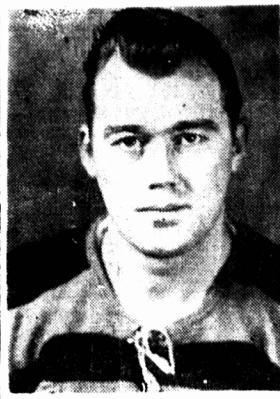
Bessette pulled off a terrific save on Johnny Lumley early in the first period as Campbell, Farrell and Lumley came up with a smart passing play inside the Islanders blue line. Campbell put Lumley in the clear but Bessette poked the puck off his stick.

Bobby Brown opened the scoring for the visitors on a solo rush into the Islanders end. He took a pass from Gordie Miller at center ice, side stepped an Islanders defenseman and missed the net on his first drive. Brown got his own rebound off the backboards and beat Bessette with a knee shot from about 12 feet out. It took the Islanders eight minutes to get the equalizer. Carver and Sandon combined to send Gray in on the Glace Bay net and Bob triggered a 25 foot ankle high shot into the cordage.

About half a minute later the Islanders struck again to move into the lead. Gray broke up a play inside the Glace Bay line and Carver flipped the puck out to Spike Laliberte who beat Hicks on a 25 footer.

Whitlock drew a hooking penalty and while he was off Gustavson, McLaughlin, Robert and Gignac kept the Miners from getting close to the Islanders net. Whitlock was just preparing to come back on the ice when Rochford got a two minute penalty and he was followed to the box 12.

Despite their two main advantages the Islanders failed to get a shot on net. Farrell, Whyte and Lumley held the fort and finally Lumley broke away to fire the puck into the lower left hand corner and tie the score four seconds before the end of the period. Whyte and Farrell assisted on the goal.

As the Miners left the ice at the end of the period a fan and Lumley became involved in a brief scuffle. Order was restored without too much trouble.

Hicks came up with a smart save off hard working Guy Gignac early in the second period. Gignac played on a line with Whitlock and Robert replacing the injured Vip Palladino. Vip injured his hip in Halifax Saturday and after one turn on the ice last night was forced to call it quits.

Whyte, Glace Bay defenseman, was forced to the dressing room after being hit hard at the Islanders blue line by Gustavson. Whyte on a solo dash into the Islanders end was hit on the leg as he attempted to cut in towards the Islanders defense. He returned later in the period and finished the game. The blow slowed him down noticeably.

Sandon scored the winning goal for the Islanders as his persistent digging around the Miners net paid off. He took about three wacks at the puck before the disc finally hopped over Hicks' pads into the net. Laliberte and Carver assisted.

Laliberte went right to Hicks' door step in the early minutes of the third period but the young netminder outgassed him on a fine play.

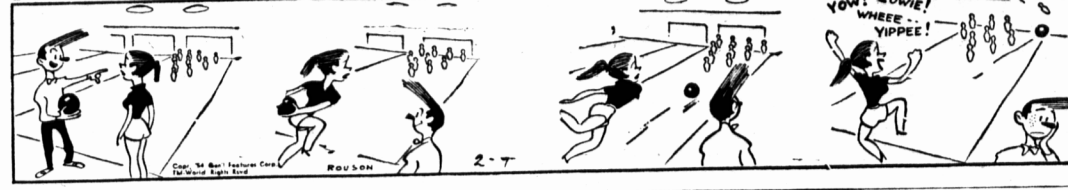
The rest of the period was marked by the fine play of Bessette especially against the fast skating Myles, Farrell, Lumley line. Kevin Rochford also came up with some smart offensive hockey as did Bobby Brown.

Laliberte started the play for the insurance goal with a pass to Sandon at center ice territory where Carver picked up a loose puck and drilled a shot that hit the goal post. The rubber danced on the crease for a second before Carver got his stick on the puck and whipped it into the twines.

The Miners came back strong. A penalty to Farrell in the dying seconds washed out their chances of pulling the game out of the fire.

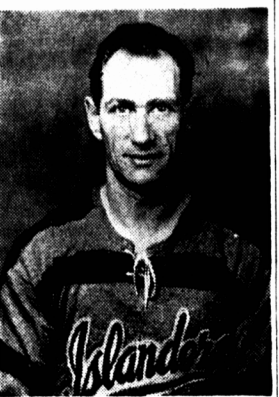

St. Laurent was injured late in Sunday night's National Hockey League game in New York, when Canadiens defeated the Rangers 4-1. Reports reaching here said St. Laurent was boarded by Nick Mickoski and it is feared the Montreal defenseman suffered a chipped bone in his shoulder.

Macpherson was recently sent to Montreal Royals of the Quebec Hockey League subject to immediate recall. He will rejoin the NHL club for Thursday night's game in Chicago.

St. Laurent is expected to return to Montreal immediately. Further examination then will determine how long he will be laid up.

Atlantics Freed From Paying \$500 Fine For Missing Ch'town Game

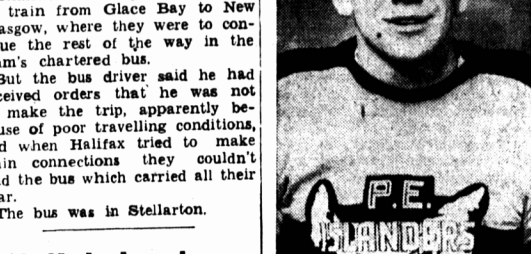

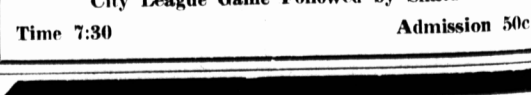
