

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 8.

Sir Leonard Tilley visited the Starr Manufacturing Company, Rope Works and Symonds Foundry, Dartmouth, to-day.

Harry Bowers was severely injured at the Sugar Refinery, at half-past two o'clock this p. m. He was engaged inside the building filling tubs with bricks and as one of the tubs was being hoisted it tilted over, one of the bricks from which struck him on the head, breaking his skull and inflicting a terrible wound. No hopes of his recovery are entertained. He has a wife and family.

A committee of citizens from Dartmouth interviewed Sir S. L. Tilley, to-day in reference to the proposed Branch Railway from Windsor Junction to that town. The Minister stated that the project had already received the attention of the Government but had been overshadowed by the legislation for the sale of the Pacific Railway. It would, however, be again considered at the first opportunity.

MONTREAL, Sept. 8.

The Provincial Synod opened this forenoon in Synod Hall here. A procession was formed in the following order: Lay delegates; Clerical delegates in order of Dioceses, according to priority of erection, and as nearly as possible according to individual seniority of ordination; the Rev. Dr. Beredley and the Rev. Dr. Paone, delegates from the sister churches in the United States; the Bishops in order of seniority of their dioceses; the Bishop of Montreal, being preceded by his Chaplain, the Rev. Canon Evans; the Bishop of Ontario, by his Chaplain, the Rev. Canon Jones, bearing His Lordship's pastoral staff; and the most Rev. the Metropolitan, being preceded by his Chaplain, the Rev. T. E. Dowling, bearing His Lordship's pastoral staff, and the Rev. Charles Hamilton, and immediately preceded by the Right Rev. Dr. Miles, Bishop of New Hampshire.

A considerable congregation had assembled in the Cathedral and rose as the procession made its appearance, the "Old Hundred" being sung as a procession. The delegates halted in the aisle and separated on their side to permit His Lordship the Bishop to proceed up to the chancel. The litany was then recited by the Bishop of Toronto, after which the Right Rev. the Bishop of Nova Scotia preached from 1 Cor. iii, 11-13. The sermon was declared to have been a strongly ritualistic one, His Lordship appealing for a charitable feeling toward these of the church who believed in the real presence, and laid stress on ritual. The Lower Churchmen are very much dissatisfied.

AFGHANISTAN.

LONDON, Sept. 8.

Gen. Roberts telegraphs from Candahar, Sept. 6: Careful enquiry shows that the enemy lost very severely on the 1st inst. This was expected, as they made a determined stand when our troops were quite close. A column will start shortly to bury the dead at Kuskke Nakhud and open the district for supplies. Gen. Phayre arrived at Candahar on the 6th inst. His horse, artillery and cavalry are encamped twelve miles south of Candahar where forage and supplies are ample. The weather is hot, but the wounded are doing well and the troops are in a healthful condition.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Sept. 8.

Sir John A. Macdonald and other Canadian Government Commissioners have been successful in making a financial arrangement for the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway. The negotiations were concluded this afternoon. The contracts are taken jointly by a banking firm in London, a French Financial Association, and a firm of financiers in New York. The contracting parties will receive from the Canadian Government a certain number of millions sterling in cash or its equivalent, to be provided by issue of Canadian Government Bonds (not backed, however, by Imperial guarantee), and a certain number of millions of acres of land. In consideration of these grants, the contracting parties undertake to form a company to be called the "Pacific Railway Company," which shall construct and work the line in perpetuity. The Government furthermore gives to the contracting parties, in addition to the surveys already made, the whole of the line thus far built. The cost of these items is put at between five and six millions sterling.

LONDON, Sept. 8—5 p. m.

Seven men who were in Seaham coal pit at the time of the explosion are safe. There are still 165 men unheard from and it is feared they have perished.

LATER.

LONDON, Sept. 8.

A despatch from Sedham colliery this evening announces that forty men who were working in two upper seams of coal have been found safe and well. Some of them volunteered and are helping to rescue their comrades, who are ten fathoms lower down. The bottom of both shafts are still blocked with debris. One hundred and fifty men are still in the pit.

The reported agreement between Bismarck and Baron von Haymerle is intended to lead to an alliance between Germany, Austria and Roumania, the latter to be raised to the rank of a kingdom in its integrity and independence, guaranteed by Germany and Austria, thus blocking Russia's land route to Balfan Peninsula.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 8.

A new issue of the Nihilist Will of the People has been put in circulation here, of the date of September 3rd.

BERLIN, Sept. 8.

Private advices from St. Petersburg announce that the difference between Russia and China have been finally arranged, and

a new treaty is to be signed at Peking. The Marquis of Tseng is expected to leave St. Petersburg in a fortnight.

LONDON, Sept. 8.

It is announced that the engagements of the Prince and Princess of Wales will prevent them from making their intended visit to Australia to attend the Exhibition.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Sept. 8.

Last night three policemen discovered four burglars with a coach containing \$10,000 worth of sealskin sacs, which they had just stolen. One burglar escaped, another was captured after a hard struggle, and two others, after exchanging several shots with the police were both shot through the leg and secured.

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla., Sept. 8.

It is stated that \$200,000 worth of the cargo of the steamer Vera Cruz and other vessels was washed ashore hereabouts, great quantities of which has been appropriated by the citizens.

ST. GEORGES, Bermuda Sept. 8.

The severe storm here for a century raged on Sunday night. It began between three and four o'clock on Sunday afternoon with a heavy fall of rain, the wind changed to northwest. At about ten o'clock the wind shifted to the southwest and the storm moderated. The amount of damage throughout the colony is very great. Trees were uprooted and gardens destroyed. Banana orchards were laid low, and thousands of dollars worth of fruit destroyed. In addition to all this a vast amount of damage was done to different buildings throughout the colony, and to many of the most costly and most important public works. A portion of the causeway was destroyed, and telegraph wires were injured so that regular communication with other parts of the colony was destroyed. In and about the town of St. Georges a large amount of property was injured or destroyed.
