NEW PATIENTS ON WAY TO HOSPITAL

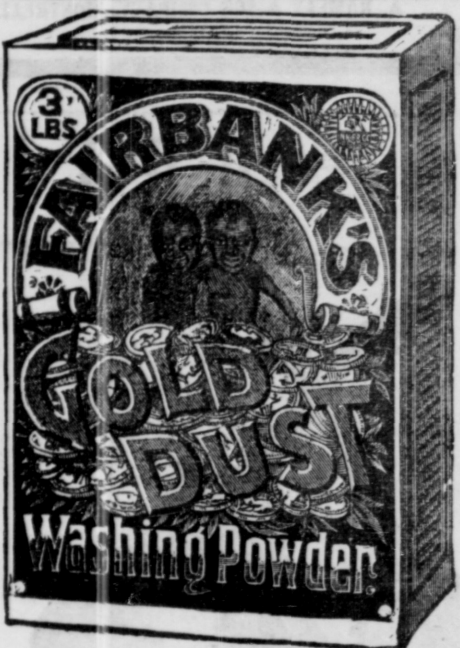
and the anxiety of the trustees to keep none waiting is shown in the decision reached a few weeks ago to increase the accommodation by twenty-five beds.
