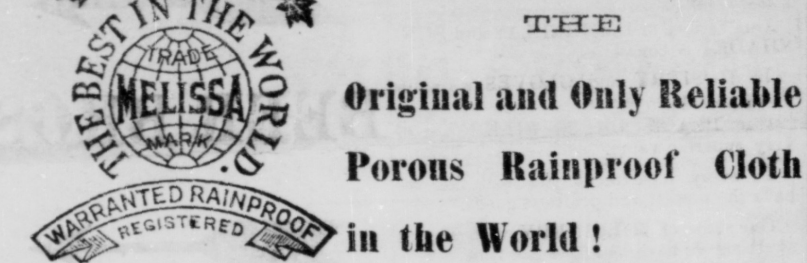

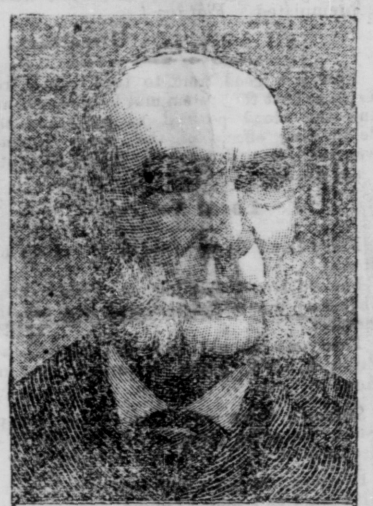

OTTAWA LETTER

An Interesting Budget of News.

(Special correspondence of The Examiner.) In supply, upon the vote for general repairs and improvements of harbors and rivers in the Maritime Provinces, Mr. Perry enquired if the Government intended to continue blasting the rock in Casimpec Harbor.

On the vote for additional dredging, Mr. Perry said he had observed by return that of a grant of over \$10,000 in the years 1890 and 1891 for Prince County piers and wharves, only \$5,000 had been expended.

On the vote for \$50,000 for the P. E. Island Railway, Mr. Haggart said that there has been a very large deficit for the eight months of the present year, the expenditure having been \$229,996, as against \$184,808 last year.

The Opposition have a great horror of monopolies, grinding monopolies, etc., and Mr. Edgar, the sweet singer from West Ontario, called the attention of the Government last week to the recent purchase by the Canadian Colored Cotton Mills Company of nearly all the colored cotton mills in the Dominion; and he asked, if this transaction resulted in raising the price of cotton, what would the Government do about it?

Sir John Thompson briefly replied that, in such case, the tariff would speedily be lowered to admit of competition from outside, which would immediately mend matters.

This frank statement of the Minister of Justice will be welcome to the people. Manufacturers are very good people to have; but, like any other class in the community, they must not be allowed to take the consumers by the throat.

Mr. Thomas Murray is a Grit patriot who stepped in last election between two Conservatives as representative for the County of Pictou, P. Q., which is a very large county, running away back to the north pole, with a scattered population.

Mr. Laurier replied, and never did I see the gentlemanly and refined Laurier in such a towering rage. What there was in Sir John's speech to get mad about, no one could understand at the evening session.

Mr. Tupper replied in a short and sharp speech, in which he challenged the Opposition, if they meant to charge Sir Adolphe with theft and robbery of public funds, to say so and they would get their investigation instigated.

Six o'clock was heaving in sight, and as Mr. Edgar had pleaded urgency in moving his resolution, Sir John Thompson offered, on behalf of the Government, to consent to continue the debate at the evening session.

From a careful examination of the Hansard, it has been ascertained that Mr. McMullen spoke only 756 times last session. There were several whole days when he never opened his mouth, but there were others when he spoke as often as 64 times.

On Wednesday Mr. Edgar preferred his charges against Sir Adolphe Caron, which amount briefly to these: that moneys were received from the Lake St. John Railway and from the Temiscouata Railway Company, both subsidized by the Government, to assist in carrying elections in a dozen Quebec counties.

Caron rose and said that in every particular the charges made were false; he then left the House.

Sir John Thompson counselled the House to be very cautious how they dealt with charges affecting the personal character of a member. The House had a perfect right to enquire how public moneys had been expended by the Government departments, or by others to whom they had been entrusted.

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
