SOURIS — Mayor C. E. Lavie will contact Parkdale village commissioners to determine how they arrived at the rates set for their water and sewerage system, it was decided at a special meeting of Souris Town Council last night.

The councillors, meeting to set rates for the town's new water and sewerage system, felt that their lack of experience in such matters did not qualify them to make the decision, and they would therefore approach other centers for advice.

Town clerk, Mrs. Genevieve Roach, said that about 200 houses would eventually be hooked up with the system, noting that 70 have already been connected, and another 60 have paid the necessary fee.

(Continued from page 1) had a very fair hearing and I feel much was accomplished."

He said the delegation had asked the government to investigate what he termed "public use" of the facilities of Montgomery Hall in view of the importance attached to having the dining room facilities of the Charlottetown expanded to handle the 1964 Centennial business.

The Mayor said they had asked for changes in the School Act to permit Charlottetown and Summerside to obtain financial aid in the construction of new schools.

MEAT INSPECTION

The matter of meat inspection was also raised and the civic leaders were told the remedy was simple and was in their own hands. All they have to do, it was said, was pass a city by-law forbidding the sale in Charlottetown of all meat unless it was provincial government inspected.

This action would force all slaughter houses selling meat to city merchants to call a veterinarian at the time of killing operations—whether this was once or twice a week would be up to the operators themselves.

A further meeting to discuss this will be held later between Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae, Health Minister, Dr. Hubert McNeill and city officials.

OTHER PROBLEMS

Other matters brought up in the discussions which lasted more than an hour were the breastwork at Victoria Park on which federal and provincial assistance is sought for rebuilding; a reminder of the city's offer regarding the site of the proposed new provincial building; traffic and parking problems relating to this building as well as the new Centennial Memorial; electoral reform and its relation to city representation in the Legislature; "no man's land" on the outskirts of former Spring Park; proposed city legislation to go before the 1962 session; non-resident work tax.

Properties To Be Sold For Taxes

Tax legal wheels have started turning in the city, and all properties advertised last year for non-payment of city taxes have been handed into the court for sale.

Next step in the procedure is for the Judge of the City Court to issue a warrant to the sheriff of Queens County, directing him to sell the lands at public auction.

Metro Wants Shore Areas For Recreation

The provincial government will be asked in the near future to procure shore areas in or near the metropolitan area for recreational purposes.

This was presented in the form of a resolution by Donald Stewart at the regular meeting of the Metropolitan Committee last night. The resolution noted that there was a great lack of public swimming and recreational facilities in the metropolitan area.

The committee also supported a resolution passed at the Queens No. 2 area convention of the Women's Institute asking that an area be set aside south of the Hillsboro Bridge.

The resolution, which will be presented to the minister of industry and natural resources, stated that no public swimming or picnic areas were available in the area and that swimming in the Hillsboro River is "undesirable due to contamination."

Sealers Land Helicopter At Motel

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Toronto Man Is Committed For Trial On Meat Theft

NAB MEN

ANKARA (AP)—Turkish police today started a roundup of former ministers in the cabinet of the late Premier Adnan Menderes who served before 1961. Menderes was executed on charges of misuse of authority. All those involved failed to win re-election in 1961 and were spared imprisonment following the army coup which toppled Menderes in 1960. Former Justice Minister Huseyin Yildirim, now a hotel owner, was seized early today.

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
