

N. Viet Nam Ambassador Comments On U.S. Captives

TOKYO (AP) — North Viet Nam's ambassador to China is reported to have said Tuesday captured U.S. pilots are "not prisoners of war but war criminals" and will be tried.

The United States had warned the North Vietnamese against such action.

Japanese correspondents said ambassador Tran Tu Binh told a press conference in Peking that North Viet Nam does not consider the case of the prisoners comes under the Geneva Convention for humane treatment of war captives. The reasoning is that there has been no formal declaration of war.

The North Vietnamese have been threatening trials for months.
