May Ease Curbs On Canned Fruit

OTTAWA (OP) — Britain plans to relax curbs on imports of Canadian canned fruit, it was learned Thursday. Previously imports from Canada were restricted to 10 per cent of shipments from the United States.

Officials here said that Britain now has decided to remove this 10-per-cent restriction and allow Canada to compete fully with the U.S. for the British market. It is understood, however, that some over-all import curb against the two countries will remain.

Canada's exports of canned fruit to the U.K. have been small, amounting only to about \$200,000 a year.

Mt. Stewart New School Has Its Official Opening

Several complimentary remarks were passed to the minister of education by one of the distinguished speakers on his excellent work done among the teachers, as well as improvement in educational facilities among the rural school children and thus giving them an opportunity of competing with city school children. He also remarked that it was a strange coincidence to see a native son come back to open a new school in his own home town for the future generations.

After the pupils sang several selections, the Minister of Education cut the ribbon and the new school was officially opened. The meeting closed with the singing of "God Save the Queen". The ladies of the village served a dainty buffet lunch.
