Why Do We Yawn?

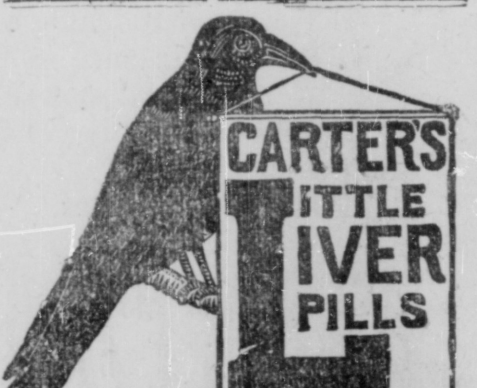
Wanted It Altered.

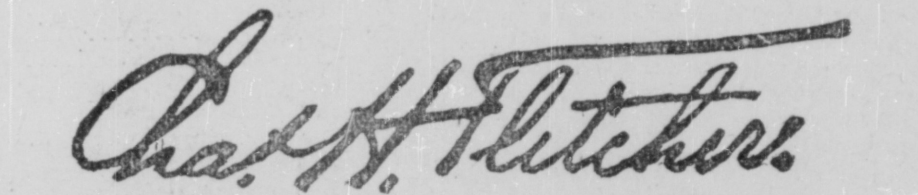
