

Details Awaited On Pension Plan

The Hon. Henry Wedge, minister of Welfare and Labor, will represent the provincial government at the federal-provincial pension plan conference Sept. 9, it was announced yesterday by Premier Walter R. Shaw.

"This province will make no commitments until we know definitely what is involved in a pension plan. Mr. Wedge will bring the answers back to us," the Premier stated.

It was the feeling of the premier that "it will take a great deal of time and discussion before the pension scheme can be brought into effect. We will have to know what the plan will cost the province over a period of time before we can decide on whether or not to join the scheme."

Premier Shaw said that in the meantime, the federal government should implement its promise to increase old age pensions. "This should be done immediately," he said.

Increasing old age pensions, he admitted, will cost the provincial government a sum of money as the province now pays a share. "At least," he said, "with a pension increase, we will know how much it will cost us, but we don't know what the cost will be of our entering a federal-provincial pension plan."

A total of 500 students, 60 more than last year, are expected to register for the term. Accommodation for nearly 200 of these will have to be found in the Charlottetown area. Registrar Michael Hennessy announced yesterday.

New U.S. Move Appears Likely To Curb Lumber

WASHINGTON (CP) — More than 100 House of Representatives members from 36 states petitioned President Kennedy Thursday in take action to provide the U.S. timber industry with economic protection from Canadian lumber imports.

The petition, drafted by Republican Jack Westland of Washington, asks for a reduction to control softwood imports is taken immediately, "there appears to be no other alternative" but that the Congress enact legislation to provide a quota.

Highway Deaths Placed At 24

Motor vehicle accidents to date in the province have accounted for an unofficial total of 24 deaths this year.

Statistics received from the provincial motor vehicle branch this morning show that up to the end of July, 19 persons had their lives in motor vehicle accidents. Figures for August were not available, but a check through newspaper files showed that at least six persons were killed in highway accidents since June had the largest number of fatalities this year with seven killed.

The fatality record for months is: January, 6; February, 3; March, 1; April, 6; May, 1; July, 6.

Two Impaired Drivers Assessed Fines Of \$125

Two accused were each fined \$125 and costs or 30 days in jail for impaired driving in City Police Court yesterday morning. Magistrate A.J. Haslam presided.

Police Ponder Similarities In N.Y., Cambridge Slayings

NEW YORK (AP) — New York police have conferred with police in Cambridge, Mass., on the similarities in the stabbing deaths of two girls in a New York apartment and the death of Beverly Sams in her Cambridge apartment last May.

One of the girls found dead Wednesday night was Emily Hoffer, 22, who recently lived in Cambridge, not far from where the 26-year-old Miss Sams was killed.

The other victim here was Janice Wylie, niece of author Phillip Wylie.

Police noted these similarities in the three girls' deaths:

- All were killed with kitchen knives; none had been sexually assaulted; medical examiners said all were the work of a maniac; all were stabbed so many times an exact count was not possible.

NO SOLID CLUES

Police today apparently had no solid clues in the stabbings of Miss Wylie and Miss Hoffer, but they leaned to the theory that the killer was the man who had made obscene and threatening telephone calls to one of the victims — Janice Wylie, pretty blonde researcher for Newsweek magazine.

Miss Wylie's father who found the bodies said he thought the caller was "maybe a crazy kid who saw a pretty pair of legs."

Detectives thought the slayer, who got into the apartment by means unknown, killed Miss Wylie first; that Miss Hoffer arrived home to find the murderer repeatedly and was killed to eliminate her as a witness. Miss Wylie's body was mangled.

Dr. Milton Halmers, chief city medical examiner, said preliminary autopsies produced "no obvious evidence that either girl was raped."

Each girl had been stabbed repeatedly in the chest, abdomen and neck.

The bloodstained murder weapon, three carving knives belonging to the girls, were found in the apartment.

Prices at Toronto were \$26.00 to \$27.50 for choice, \$25.00 to \$26.00 for good, and \$23.00 to \$24.50 for medium.

Montreal prices this week were \$25.75 to \$27.50 for choice, \$24.75 to \$26.50 for good and \$22.00 to \$24.50 for medium.
