

Local and Other Items.

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OLD SILVER wanted at E. S. Bonnell's. THE S. S. Nellie Wise left Liverpool for this port on Thursday, 22nd inst. A. B. WARBURTON, Esq., returned from St. John, N. P., on Saturday evening. The last race for the gold medal takes place to-morrow night at the Roller Rink. The Brig, Zelica, to Peake Bros. & Co., with salt from Liverpool, arrived here on the 24th inst. A GENERAL LIBERAL ASSOCIATION and a Young Men's Reform Association is to be immediately formed in St. John. A MARRIED MAN named Brossart was fined \$5 in the Montreal police court on Friday last, for forcibly kissing a young girl three times. By recent additions the stock at the Diamond Bookstore is very complete, and the prices are warranted to be lower than elsewhere. R. K. BRACE and Co. bought the Free Church building to-day. They intend to put a wind-mill on the spire for the purpose of cracking grain. FROM a number of Protestant pulpits in New York, eulogies have been pronounced on the late Archbishop McCloskey, whose memory is revered by all classes and creeds. A HALIFAX despatch says: The Labrador fishery will yield, it is now ascertained, a full average, but the Straits, though much under the catch taken down the coast, will yet give fair returns. The winter arrangements of the International Steamship Company comes into effect on November 2nd, when the steamers will leave St. John and Boston every Monday and Thursday morning. The news, says the Times, that the contract has been signed and that the first sod of the Beaulieu and Moncton Railway will be turned November 5th, will give new life to the people in the district affected. EXTRAORDINARY RAINFALL.—The rainfall in Montreal from 8 p. m. Tuesday to 8 p. m. Wednesday last, was three and three-quarter inches and up to 11 p. m. nearly four inches. This was the greatest rainfall for eleven years. HALIFAX MILITIA.—At a parade of the Halifax militia on Wednesday evening, 24th inst., a sergeant and a corporal were reduced and six privates dismissed for desertion at the time when they were called out for active service. LAY PREACHERS.—In an address to the Baptist Conference in London on the 21st inst., Mr. Spurgeon urged that every Baptist church should establish a Lay Preachers' Association, and that all members who are able to preach be encouraged to do so. A NOVEL school has been opened by an English professor in London. His avowed purpose is to bestow upon his pupils an infallible memory. He has a class in "never forgetting" and another composed of persons whose minds are given to "wandering," which habit he proposes to cure. The English Parliamentary Campaign.

Marquis of Lorne Rotten-Egged.

LONDON, Oct. 28. It is now evident that the Parliamentary campaign will not pass off without serious rioting, as party feeling, which already runs high, and daily grows more bitter. The Marquis of Lorne, Liberal candidate for Hampstead, went down to Brantford, seven miles west of London, to deliver a campaign speech. While addressing the electors a mob assaulted him with rotten eggs, and some gaining the platform, smashed his hat over his head. The supporters of the Marquis rushed to his rescue, and a fight ensued. The noble lord now became thoroughly frightened, and hastily departed from the scene, and ran through the streets in a drenching rain to the railway station, and immediately departed for London. Meanwhile the row continued.

The Eastern War Cloud.

LONDON, Oct. 25. The application to the Porte for the mandate of Europe to re-establish order in the Principalities by the sword is disapproved by England. M. Tsoumpas, the warlike premier of Greece, has been hastily and unexpectedly summoned to Athens. MISA, Oct. 25. The whole Servian cavalry force has been ordered to the frontier with sabres sharpened. It is the prevalent opinion that the Government has hitherto hesitated to adopt active measures in deference to the pressure from the Powers. The public are clamorous for war. SOFIA, Oct. 25. The Servians are invading Bulgaria, advancing by way of Klissura. They crossed the frontier at nine o'clock to-night. A force of Bulgarians are advancing to meet them. BUCHAREST, Oct. 25. A slight skirmish has taken place between the Bulgarian and Servian pickets.

Teemer Defeats Hanlan.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 25. Yesterday's race between Hanlan and Teemer was the best ever rowed in the United States. Hanlan took water first and tried to row Teemer down in the first mile, but Teemer stayed with him all the time, rowing 34 to Hanlan's 38. At the stake-boat Teemer was leading a clean length, and going like a "scared deer." He made a good turn, and called to Hanlan to "come on." Hanlan seemed to be winded, and in turning the stakeboat he fell out of his boat. He was a "dead duck" before this, however. The mile and a half to the stakeboat was made in 11m. 35s., against a strong current, most remarkable time. Teemer rowed leisurely home in 21 minutes and 13 seconds. Teemer was greatly cheered. Hanlan admitted Teemer was the best man. Hanlan backed himself heavily and his friends lost a pot of money. Had Teemer been pushed all the way the record would surely have been broken. Ross and Teemer offers to row any two oarsmen on earth for \$2,500 a side.

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FATAL SHOOTING ACCIDENT.

A lad named John Hart (colored) twelve years old, was shot through the body at Fredrickton on Wednesday, from the effects of which he died about 1 o'clock next morning. The accident occurred just back of Mr. Charles Godkin's place on the Harwell road. The little fellow overheard Dr. Coburn say that a partridge would be very nice for a sick neighbor of his—Mr. Parker. He, in company with his four year old brother, started off to get one. They had gone but a short distance from the house when he had occasion to lay the gun down and in picking it up again took hold of it by the muzzle, and while drawing it towards him the hammer became caught in some underbrush and, on being released, snapped back on the cap, exploding the charge which, entering his right side, went clear through his body. He was carried back to the house and Dr. Frank Brown summoned, but the lad was past help when the doctor arrived. Though very young he was quite expert with the gun and was thought to be very careful. The case is particularly sad as he with his 14-year old brother was the main support of his aged grandmother. His last words were a request to her to look after his dog.—St. John Globe.
