Ford Stock Split Planned, Dividend Payment Boosted

DETROIT (AP) — Directors of Ford Motor Company, in a long-awaited move, have recommended a 2-for-1 split of United States auto company's stock. They also sweetened the dividend, declaring a 90-cent a share first-quarter payment in stead of 75 cents in recent quarters and voted to redeem \$22,000,000 in Philco Corporation bonds. The stock split had been rumored in New York's Wall Street since late last summer. The stock, which rose \$2.50 Tuesday on the New York Stock Exchange, fell \$1.50 on a delayed opening block of 30,000 shares Wednesday. It trimmed part of this loss later, but closed with a \$4 decline at \$110.75 in a classic example of the old Wall Street precept that traders "buy on the rumor and sell on the news." It also was most active stock with turnover of 117,400 shares. The record high was \$117.50 a share early in December. SCHEDULE MEETING Stockholders will be asked to approve the split, and other technical manoeuvres such as doubling the authorized capital stock and cutting the \$5 par value in half, at a special meeting in Detroit May 24. Roughly 55,000,000 shares of Ford stock are outstanding in three classes. All class A stock, some 29,200,000 shares, is held by the independent Ford Foundation. This carries no voting rights. All class B stock, about 6,300,000 shares, is owned by the Ford family and relatives. This stock, which carries 1.774 votes a share, makes up 40 per cent of the voting power. CONTRACT BRIDGE

WEST NORTH EAST SOUTH
Pass Pass Pass 1 4

Opening lead—four diamonds. This hand demonstrates exceptionally fine card play. South got to four spades and West led a diamond. East took the jack with the ace and returned a low club, dummy winning the trick with the ten. The situation did not look promising. Declarer realized that if he attempted the spade finesse it would pretty surely lose. East had passed in third position, and since the play up

to this point...indicated he had two aces, it became very unlikely that he would have passed originally if he also had the king of spades. Since a heart loser appeared inevitable, barring some such holding as a singleton king, the contract seemed destined to fail. But it occurred to South that if West had the K-x of spades the contract might still be made. Acting on this assumption, he returned a club from dummy at trick three. East took the ace and returned a diamond to the king. Declarer now played a spade to the ace, cashed the king of clubs, and then continued with the queen. His purpose was to run West out of clubs and prepare for an eventual endplay. When West followed to the fourth club, declarer ruffed in dummy with the theory that West had to have the K-x of spades for him to make the hand. The queen held and South now made his bid for fame and fortune by returning a spade. This passed off pleasantly enough when East played the ten and West the king. The contract was now in the bag. West was on lead and could make no safe return. A heart lead would be fatal because it would permit South to make the queen, while a diamond return would allow dummy to ruff as declarer shed his heart loser. So South made four hearts.
