Seasonal Plans Discussed For Experimental Station

Mr. R. C. Parent, Superintendent of the Experimental Station, Charlottetown, has returned from Ottawa and Guelph, Ontario, after a week of meetings and consultations about plans for the present season.

A busy schedule of activities has been outlined at the Station for the coming months. A new soil project will be launched in the Fall; several outstanding agricultural officials will visit the Station in the near future; a special exhibition will be held during Festive Week, and several other events will be held on the Station grounds.

Mr. Parent spent two days at the Experimental Station head office at Ottawa. He met the directors and divisional chiefs and discussed with them the various details of operating the Station. He received authorization to commence a new project entitled "Control of Water Erosion of Soil". The project, to be commenced in the Fall, will compare the soil and water losses up and down hill cropping against contour cropping. The water and soil losses will be caught in large tanks and from these receptacles it will be possible to determine the amount of water and soil washed off the land. The project will be carried out at Upton Farm and will run for a number of years.

Dr. Akenhead's Visit
Mr. Parent concluded plans with Mr. N. B. Davies, Dominion Horticulturalist for a visit to the Charlottetown Station and to the Province of Mr. D. A. Akenhead, Director of the Commonwealth Bureau of Horticulture and Plantation Crops at the East Malling Research Station, East Malling, England.

Mr. Akenhead will address the members of the Agricultural Institute of Canada at a garden party which will be held at the Experimental Station on Wednesday, June 13.

It is also expected that the new Chief of the Dominion Animal Husbandry Division, Mr. K. Rasmussen, will visit the Station late in the summer. Mr. F. K. Kristjansson, Animal Geneticist, will visit the Station about the same time.

These two men will meet the members of the Prince Edward Island Swine Breeders Association and it is hoped that some research work in swine breeding and swine nutrition will be planned.

Mr. Parent also made arrangements with the Department of Exhibits, Dominion Department of Agriculture for an exhibition on the Experimental Station float during Festive Week. This exhibition will feature grass farming and soil conservation.

Other Activities

Extra-curricular activities will be started at the Station next Monday. The Charlottetown Rotarians will have dinner at the Station and they will be joined by members of the Maritime Strawberry Growers Association. The ladies of the Parkdale Women's Institute will serve the meal.

The Strawberry Association will view the strawberry work at the Farm. In addition they will view a parade of livestock and a parade of modern farm machinery.

While Mr. Parent was in Ottawa he attended a meeting of the representatives of the Provincial Fertilizer Boards (Eastern Canada) and members of the Advisory Board under the Fertilizer Act. He reported that it was the opinion of the meeting that super phosphate might be in short supply for 1952 owing to the shortage of sulphur for making sulphuric acid.

Some of the following subjects were discussed at the meeting: "Supply of Fertilizer Material for 1951-52"; "High Analysis of Fertilizers"; "Acid Versus Basic Fertilizers"; "The World Fertilizer Situation as Viewed by F.A.O."

The following day he attended a meeting of the Eastern Canadian Society of Animal Production. Mr. Parent was the symposium leader for all addresses on livestock breeding.

He stated that there were five very special papers presented on the breeding of poultry, beef cattle, dairy cattle, sheep and swine.

"Every speaker," he said, "stressed the value of purebred livestock in the past as in the future and they indicated that some of the modern trends in breeding was towards development of special lines within the breed and in some cases crossing these special lines to obtain desired results and hybrid vigor."

Visited Kelmscott Farm
The day after the convention he visited Kelmscott Farm, outside Guelph which is operated by Mr. E. L. Taylor, an Englishman who raises English Yorkshires.

Mr. Taylor maintains a herd of 200 breeders and all except the young stock have been imported from Great Britain in the past two or three years. All mature sows are kept in the pasture.

Mr. Parent was greatly impressed with the size and great strength of the bone of the older breeding stock. He said that the young pigs looked very similar to our own Island Yorkshires but they were not quite as smooth.

While flying over the Province on his return trip Mr. Parent said that a person could see many straw piles out on back fields. He regretted that this was the case, he said, as the straw should either be under livestock or on the ground.

He said that Prince Edward Island land was in a bad need for organic matter and he recommended that the straw be spread on hillsides to prevent soil erosion.

Island Odds And Ends

Reverend "Archie" Murchison, who has been in the same pastorate in New York State for the past eighteen years, is spending a vacation in Charlottetown, his home for many years. Mr. Murchison's parish is not far from the famous Sing-Sing prison, and recently he was offered a chaplaincy in that noted penitentiary. His work has frequently taken him within its walls and on one occasion he made the last walk with a condemned man from the death house to the electric chair.

Asked whether he would accept the prison job, Rev. Mr. Murchison said he had not yet decided. "There's considerable bother about getting in and out of the place," he explained, "and sometimes after going through all the formalities of gaining access, you almost feel like a prisoner yourself."

Mr. Murchison is visiting his brother, Rev. John Murchison, now resident in the Province, and his sister, Mrs. Willard Spencer.

There is far less construction work under way in Charlottetown than last year, and much less contemplated. Twelve months ago several new buildings were rising in mid-town, and in the East end the new fertilizer plant, five hundred feet long, was taking shape, and a new Government garage. Many new homes were also taking form, all over town, but notably in the Brighton district. Today one of the few large buildings under construction is the Holy Redeemer Hall in the North end. However, DeBolis Brothers are preparing to erect a new warehouse on Water Street adjacent to and connected with their present warehouse and offices, and a new service station well on its way at the corner of Euston and Elm Avenue. New houses are going up too, but far fewer than last year. In spite of the let-up in construction practically all tradesmen are employed, thanks to a considerable number of alteration jobs all over town, and there is very little unemployment at the present time.

In informed circles considerable confidence is felt that some defence contracts will be awarded Charlottetown firms. Whether these will mean the purchase of new equipment is not known. It is known that the authorities seem prepared to divert a share

of defence projects this way if the work can be done here. The officials who looked over the situation here will very likely have some suggestion to offer in this respect.

Even a hundred men steadily employed would be quite a boon to the City. Too many of our tradesmen are employed only six or eight months of the year, and our labourers scarcely that long. Year around work for a proportion of these would benefit every storekeeper in town as well as the men and their families.

After the coming new year it is understood that old age pensions will be paid by the Dominion Department of National Health and Welfare. At present old age pensions are administered

by the Province, and the staff is on the Provincial Government payroll. Under the new arrangement it would appear that in future old age pension office personnel will become Federal civil servants paid from Ottawa. At least some changes are in the making to conform to legislation now being framed.

Charlottetown would very much like to see the long-talked-of Marine Slip get the nod of approval, under the defence scheme. It's been a dream for years, and is once more in the forefront of our aspirations. It could be mighty handy in war-time and well out of the way of the top-rated industrial centres. Bombing, be it atom, or conventional.
