Murder Trial Of O'Connor Begins At Georgetown

The trial of Elmer Herbert O'Connor, Gladstone, charged with murder in the death of William MacKenzie, Glen Martin, on June 18, began at Georgetown yesterday, the second week of the November sittings of the Supreme Court presided over by Mr. Justice Mark R. McGulgan. Present for the prosecution were Premier and Attorney General, A.W. Matheson, and J.P. Nicholson, Crown prosecutor for Kings. Representing the accused was Mr. R.R. Bell, Q.C. The morning session was taken up with the selection of a petit jury with the prosecution having four challenges and the defense three. Twenty-nine names were called from a total of thirty-seven before the jury was selected, the members of which are: Howard MacLeod, Dundas, Foreman, Bennett Lewis, St. Peter's; Chester Whiteway, Murray River; Robert Ald Coffin, Rollo Bay; Robert Aorn, Dundas; Earl McEwen, Greenwich; Alfred Donnelly,

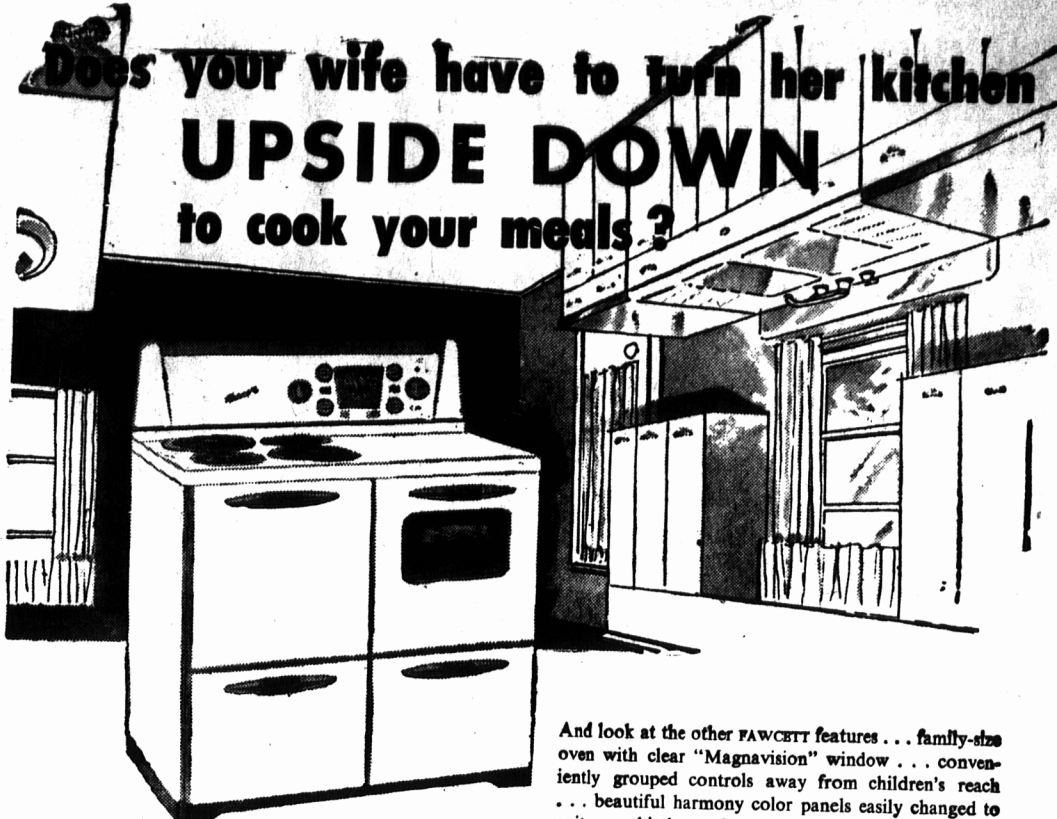

evidence and the jury returned to the courtroom. The statement is as follows: I, Elmer Herbert O'Connor, having been warned by Const. R. C. Pettitt, a member of the R. C. M. P., Montague detachment, as follows: "You need not say anything, you have nothing to hope from any promise or favor, and nothing to fear from any threat, whether or not you do say anything. Anything you do say may be used as evidence" do hereby state as follows:

On Saturday, the 18th of June, 1955, I left my work at Kinkora at 11.00 a.m. and went to Borden where I purchased three pints of gin. From Borden I went to Charlottetown with my foreman, John MacDonald of Charlottetown. From Charlottetown I, along with two other fellows, hired a taxi to Montague. From Montague I got a ride to Alfred Moore's at Whim Road where I had left my truck. I took my truck and headed out to Whim where my wife and two children were living. On the way there I opened a bottle of gin and took a couple of drinks. I arrived at Whim MacKenzie's around 7.00 p.m. and went into the house where my wife and two children were. MacKenzie was out splitting wood at the time. I was only in the house a few minutes when my wife and I started arguing, and she called her uncle, William MacKenzie, and he came into the house and he and I started fighting. Then we went outside and he struck me with his fist and I hit him back, knocking him to the ground. Then I started toward the truck and he followed me out to the gate. When I went to go out the gate he came at me with the axe and I tried to defend myself. When he swung at me with the axe, I hit him and knocked him down, and I don't know what happened then. The next I remember was MacKenzie lying on the ground by the gate, and I left there and went over to Sam MacPherson's to see if I could get someone to go over and see what was wrong with MacKenzie, but couldn't get anyone, so I went back to where

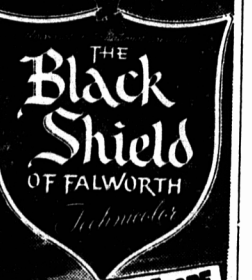
