These conditions give rise to a difficulty in ascertaining the true value of merchandise imported from Germany to Canada, the duty being always charged upon the value of the goods in the country of production.

Under the Melghen Government and with the object of discouraging the importation of German goods and the competition of cheap German labor with the better paid labor of Canada, our tariff was so adjusted that the value for duty of German goods should not be less than 50 per cent. of the German market value. That is, half the price as expressed in German marks. Take, for example, a bill of German goods selling in Germany for 100,000 marks. The price of the lot of

Under the change arrangement the value of the same parcel of goods would be just now \$33.33, and the duty would be the nominal sum of one dollar. This would be a manifest absurdity. Fortunately the anti-dumping clause in the tariff act was allowed to remain unrepelled, and this is all apparently that saves Canada from becoming a slaughter market for cheap German wares manufactured at one-third of the cost at which they could be produced in the British Isles or in Canada. At the same time Germany has good cause to be thankful to Mr. Fielding, and that is why Sir Henry Drayton spoke of the new tariff as a "2½ per cent. British preference along with German free trade."

Why and how can Germany manufacture so cheaply? Because the German artisan works long hours and for incredibly small wages. "You can hire a German chauffeur for \$3 a month," said Sir Henry Drayton. Think of 10 cents a day for a chauffeur, and other lines of employment equally cheap. But that 10 cents a day, or \$3 a month, represents 30 German paper marks for the day and 900 paper marks per month, and enough paper marks will buy anything a man wants to live on in Germany. Worthless outside, the mark is good enough inside of the German boundaries, it pays wages, it buys food and passes current everywhere. And
