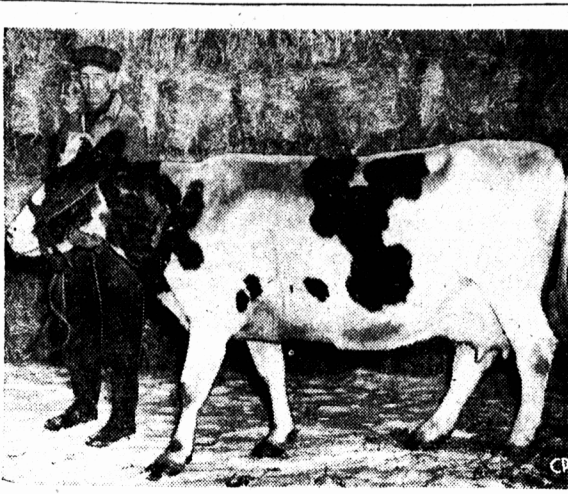

In July, 1951, when she was 19, she produced 13,125 pounds of milk with 4.25 per cent butterfat in 365 days.
