On Monday evening, May 2nd, in St. David's Hall, Georgetown, the annual father and son banquet took place, with Mr. Gordon Maxwell of Charlottetown Y. M. C. A. as guest speaker. Accompanying him from Charlottetown, were his young son Bob, Mr. Jack McNair, and Mr. McKay.

Following the supper, a short sing-song was held. Mr. McKay gave a solo, following which Mr. Tom Renton joined Mr. McKay in singing a duet. The accompanist was Mrs. E. Eason. Before introducing the speaker, Mr. Jack McNair referred to the pleasure he had derived in assisting to inaugurate United Men's organizations on the Island in the last two years, including the recent large one at Summerside, and that there are now eight such associations on P. E. I. He then introduced Mr. Gordon Maxwell.

Mr. Maxwell, who hails from the West Coast and has spanned a continent in the interest of his fifteen years service to the Y. M. C. A. He spoke of the Charlottetown "Y" as a well-established branch which enjoys wonderful leadership. He conveyed greetings from other clubs across the country, in connection with the origin of the Y. M. C. A. Mr. Maxwell stated that the gathering in Paris, France, will see the gathering together of 11,000 members celebrating the 100th anniversary of the founding of the World's Alliance of the "Y." This tremendous movement had its beginnings in the meeting of twelve young men in England who, over a hundred years ago banded together for the preservation of moral strength. Mr. Maxwell pointed out to his listeners that in such a humble beginning and also in small numbers, there can be great strength and much valuable spiritual work accomplished. He urged that special attention be paid to youth, early influence is most important. That it has been determined through surveys, that young people's immediate companions are those who most influence them. Mr. Maxwell therefore stressed group training and organized, clean sportsmanship as a very necessary service to youth, for which adult groups are responsible.

Mr. Preston MacDonald thanked the speaker for his inspiring address. Further appreciative remarks were proffered by Rev. Paterson, Mr. C. Lelacheur, and Mr. McNair.

During the short business session which followed, the association agreed to finance the cost of printing the annual church statement. Mr. Nelson Hansen was named delegate to the Georgetown Film Council. The members then adjourned until the opening fall session.

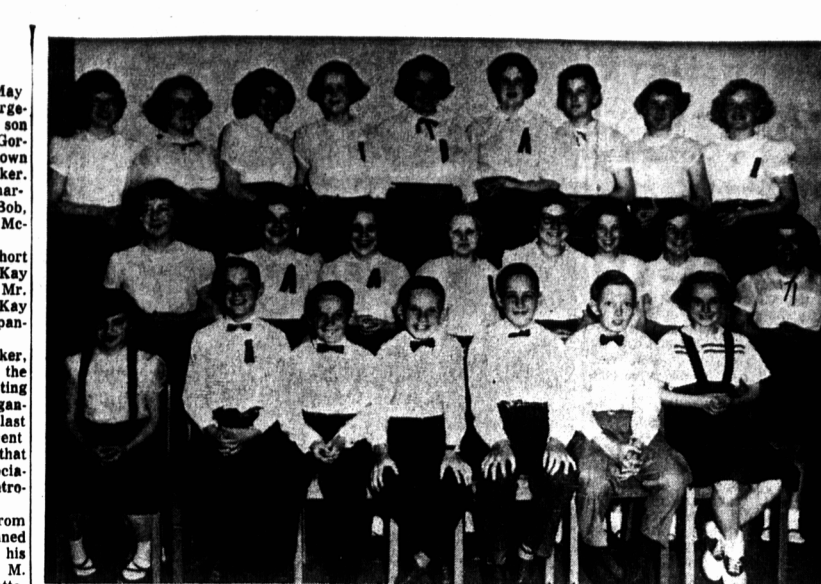

TORONTO, (CP)—The brother-in-law of the Canadian-born bride of Pakistan's Premier Mohammed Ali Tuzday was sentenced to six months in jail on three fraud charges involving a total of \$325. Police said it was Saleem Zrien's third fraud conviction. They added proceedings to deport him will be started. Investigators said Zrien came to Canada from Lebanon several years ago on a Lebanese government scholarship to study political science at Montreal's McGill University.
