

Orioles' Pitching Sensations Score 5-1 Win Over Tigers

 Jerry Walker and Milt Pappas, Baltimore's kid pitching sensations, throttled Detroit Tigers with a six-hitter Wednesday and the Orioles captured a 5-1 decision in Briggs Stadium.

Walker had a two-hitter going into the seventh inning but wilted in muggy heat and Pappas, a native Detroit, came on and preserved Walker's eighth triumph against five defeats. Each of the pitchers is just 20 years old.

The Tigers spoiled the Walker-Pappas shutout bid in the seventh when Steve Demeter hit a run-producing double in his first major league at-bat. He played third base the last two innings and veteran Eddie Yost switched to second for the first time in his long career.

SALT IT AWAY EARLY
 Demeter reported Tuesday from the Tigers' farm club at Charleston, W. Va., in the American Association. His double routed Walker and Pappas pitched two-hit ball the rest of the way.

The Orioles sailed away the victory early with the help of a couple of gift runs. They scored twice in the first and one of the runs was unearned because of an error by shortstop Coot Veal on a double-play grounder.

Veal also babbled Brooks Robinson's lead-off bouncer in the second and the Orioles tallied an unearned run. They added single runs in the sixth and seventh off starter Paul Foytack, who gave way to Pete Bunsade after seven innings.

Commissioner Ford Frick Wants 3rd Loop Formed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Baseball Commissioner Ford C. Frick said Wednesday he wants to see the formation of a third major league and believes that it will "become an eventuality."

He told the Senate anti-trust and monopoly subcommittee that it will "not be simple and not be easy."

"It will take planning and scheming to bring it about," he said during testimony on legislation to clarify the status of professional baseball, football, hockey and basketball under the anti-trust laws.

Frick said all problems would be discussed openly and fully at an Aug. 18 meeting between the founders of the Continental League and his seven-man committee from the existing majors.

FRICK WARNED
 Sen. John Carroll (Dem-Colo.) remarked he would consider it most inadvisable for the 16 existing major league clubs to prevent the formation of a third major league. Any blockade move would force Congress to take action "to break it up."

Asked by Carroll whether the third league would participate in the world series, Frick replied that "eventually, it would have to."

He said that some system would have to be worked out when the teams in the new league attained a status comparable to those in the American and National Leagues.

Sen. Estes Kefauver (Dem-Tenn.), sponsor of a bill to fix an 80-man player limit, wanted to know where the new league would get its players.

FULL RIGHTS
 Frick said the new league would come into the baseball organization with all the rights of developments available to the existing clubs.

They would, he said, "not necessarily" have to get their players from the present 16 major league clubs.

"They will acquire draft rights, rights of waivers, rights to negotiate, rights to trade and purchase contracts, rights to have working agreements with minor league clubs," he said.

Kefauver, the subcommittee chairman, has argued that a player limit would help insure players for the new league.

Pirates Are Not Giving Up Yet

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "This Irishman isn't giving up and neither are the Pirates."

That was manager Donny Murtaugh speaking after his Pittsburgh baseball club dropped its eighth straight game Tuesday night.

He added: "We'll snap out of this slump and start a winning streak."

The Pirates had just lost to Los Angeles Dodgers 9-4.

Before the game Murtaugh had been optimistic.

"I never make predictions," Murtaugh told reporters, "but I'd like to cite you a case and let you draw your own conclusions."

"With two weeks to go in last year's race, we were seven games behind Milwaukee, yet everybody still gave us a chance. Now we're in fifth place 6½ games out and we've still got two months to go."

"I'm not panicky about our losing streak. I think if you'll look up the figures you'll find that we're just about even with our 1938 pace for the same period."

The Pirates skipper said that Bob Friend, his 22-game winner of last season who has won only four this year, has been having terrible luck.

He made his start in the majors with Philadelphia Phillies back in 1936. He stayed in the Quaker City until 1940 when he was traded to Cincinnati in mid-season. That year he helped the Redlegs to a National League pennant and a world championship over the Detroit Tigers.

In 1941 he went to the New York Giants, then served four years in the army. He returned to the Giants in 1946, went to Jersey City of the International League before drawing his release. Later he worked for the Chicago Cubs organization and recently was a scout for the Philadelphia Phillies.

Arnovich who was 49 years of age played the outfield throughout his career.

Miss Hanson fired a solid 78 while Walker and Beer came home with identical scores of 72. The match, which was a best ball affair, ended in a tie, with each pair winning five holes and eight ending in a draw.

No official record of the old course mark was available for reference last night. But old timers believe the record to be about 82 and to have been set some 20 years ago. Miss Ziske's score was five-under par for ladies.

The two visiting lady golfers gave a large galaxy of followers a demonstration of some of the finest golf ever seen at Belvedere. Booming drives, fine recoveries, and excellent putting drew round after round of applause from fans.
