Alberta Pioneer Member of Group Sent West 1879

NANTON, Alta., May 7.—(C.P.)—Donald Grey, 76, one of Alberta's first pioneers, believes he is the only living member of the band of 24 young men sent west in 1879 to take care of western Blackfoot Indians who were starving because of mass killing of buffalo by western hunters.

Grey was 19 when he boarded the train at Toronto with 23 young companions. Sir John A. Macdonald, then Premier of Canada, had farwelled to the party. They reached Pincher Creek, Alta., after making the western journey through the United States. Outfits were purchased at Ogden, Utah, and the northwestern journey started on foot. The boundary was crossed at Chief Mountain, near Helena, Montana.

At the time, Mr. Grey recalls, all mail came to the western plains via Fort Benson, Montana. The little band was split up and allotted to various stations in the west. Mr. Grey was placed on the Blackfoot Reserve, and his duty was to issue rations to the natives. The ration consisted of one pound of flour to each Indian per day. He was later moved to the Sarcee Reserve.

During his work he frequently met Jerry and Billy Gladstone, famed scouts of the original North West Mounted Police.

In 1884 when his contract expired he began sheep farming on an extensive scale. Two years later he sold his sheep and concentrated on cattle. For more than 30 years the ranch situation on Sheep Creek, near Gladstone, Alta., was operated by Mr. Grey.

No Immediate Devaluation of French Franc

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PARIS, May 7.—Whatever may be the ultimate result of the French franc action to the institution of a gold embargo or regulation of foreign exchange transactions will be taken for the present, the cabinet of Premier Sarraut decided today.

Marcel Regnier, minister of finance, announced after the session tonight that there would be no embargo and that "we will take special measures against gold while I am here."

His announcement followed a day of extreme activity in the foreign exchange market during which the heavy outflow of gold from the vaults of the Bank of France continued.

The Sarraut cabinet, some members of which were defeated in the runoff election which swept the "people's front" coalition of Leftists into a majority in the Chamber of Deputies, decided to retain office until the next chamber convenses June 1, thus precluding the possibility of any action against gold until after that date.

Education to Control Safety in Driving

WINDSOR, Ont., May 7.—Convinced that only by education can the heavy toll of automobile accidents be reduced, A. F. Falls, P.O.A., retired city auditor of Windsor, has launched a campaign to introduce safe driving courses in every high school in Canada. Mr. Falls expects to have a course introduced into the secondary school of the historic town of Amherstburg during the coming school term.

Throughout the past year, the Windsor man has written to educational officials in the nine provinces of Canada and the 48 States of the Union and he has gathered together complete data on safety education, including more than a dozen samples of courses now in use in American schools. He is placing this material at the disposal of any Canadian official or private citizen interested in automotive safety work.

"A critical situation exists in our national life in which we very much need the help of the high schools," Mr. Falls states. "It seems to me that the high schools of the country can do much to cope with the problem of automobile fatalities in a fundamental way than any other agency that can be brought into action."

"In one year in the United States 36,000 people are killed and more than a million injured, a shocking total that represents an increase of 15 per cent over previous years. The economic loss one and a half billion dollars a year, more than the value of the output of the automobile industry in 1934 and almost equal to the entire cost of the public school system."

"It is unexcusable that people who stand indefinitely for such wanton slaughter and waste. The high school may hold the key to the solution for the problem is largely educational; furthermore the young driver is a problem in himself, since statistics indicate that the high point for accidents occurs among drivers considerably under thirty."

"A railroad," Mr. Falls pointed out, "does not put a man in charge of a locomotive until he has had years of training, yet in places mere children and with no training are legally able to operate high-powered cars and in no community on this continent so far as I can learn have specific agencies been set up for teaching young people how to drive outside of the schools. The young people of our country should certainly have some special education and training before they are allowed to become the drivers of tomorrow."

Mr. Falls is of the opinion that safe driving can be introduced in Canadian high schools at very little expense and without disrupting existing curricula. He is endeavoring to feel out public opinion in every Canadian community having a high school and will welcome mail addressed to him at Windsor.

Lady Drake Opens Tourist Season

HALIFAX, N.S., May 7.—The sailing of the cruise liner "Lady Drake" Canadian National steamships from Halifax Thursday night via Boston for Bermuda, the Leeward and Windward Islands, Barbados, Trinidad and British Guiana opens the present tourist season of the liners, consisting of a series of 17 cruises during the remainder of the year, these operating between Halifax and British Guiana touching 12 different ports with return to Boston and Saint John. Among passengers of prominence on the present sailing will be the following: Russell Black of Montreal, branch office inspector Sun Insurance Co., of Garry and Mrs. Black, also Francis W. Dahl, cartoonist with the Boston Herald and Mrs. Dahl. Joining the ship southbound at Antigua will be His Honor Bernard Arthur Green, Chief Justice of British

MADE IN CANADA

Would Adjust Tariff Ridden World

LONDON, May 6.—(C.P. Cable)—Increased trade within the British Commonwealth of Nations is not incompatible with the promotion of trade on a wider basis and "an effort to bring about the return of commercial sanity to a tariff-ridden world," declared Hon. Vincent Massey, Canadian High Commissioner to Great Britain, in a speech at a dinner of the London Chamber of Commerce.

Responding to the toast "Intra-Imperial Trade" proposed by Earle Page, Deputy Prime Minister of Australia, Mr. Massey said the component parts of the Empire could do a good deal to help each other. "If questions of tariffs and preferences could be approached with imagination and reasonable knowledge of one another's difficulties, the High Commissioner said, their reciprocal commerce could be promoted on a mutually satisfactory basis, which was the only one that could give their arrangements some reasonable hope of continuity."

The imponderable or sentimental aspect of trade was a powerful factor, and all things being equal, most people within the British Commonwealth, he believed, preferred to buy articles from one another rather than from beyond the bounds of the Commonwealth.

While the members of the British Commonwealth wished to trade with one another, and he believed they would do so increasingly, they had no desire to neglect the trade which lay in a still larger field. What the world wanted most today was the assurance of peace, and one of the greatest threats to peace came from those menacing economic conditions arising from the fatal illusion that nations could be self-contained in a world which had become physically, economically and politically more and more inter-dependent.

More Than Half Irish Free States Grows Potatoes

Over half of the land under crops in the Irish Free State is devoted to oats and about 75 per cent of the output is fed to live stock. Wheat growing is on the increase, the government assisting in its production. The growing of sugar beets is also on the increase, three additional beet factories having been established since the first erected in 1926. The acreage planted to potatoes shows a slight decrease, 336,000 in 1934. The government has been active in developing an economic change-over from live-stock production to tillage and industrial expansion. Flour-milling has been re-established in the north and a marked development in the wool and shoe industry while over 30 distinct makes of motor vehicles are now assembled in the Free State, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways.

Trade and Population Canada-China Compared

China with her four hundred million of people has less than half of the foreign trade of Canada's ten million. Imports into China during 1935 were valued at approximately 331 million dollars Canadian, as compared with Canada's 522 millions of dollars. In exports, Canada's total amounted to 688 millions of dollars as against China's 207 millions. Canada increased her sale of products to China during 1935 by about 6 per cent, while Canada's purchases from China increased by nearly 16 per cent, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. Among the important items in the goods sold by Canada to China figuring in this increase are railway ties, logs, newsprint, kraft paper, flour, zinc, sulphate of ammonia, motor cars, beer and dairy cattle. China's leading exports to Canada showing increasing importance are shelled peas, peanuts, walnuts in the shell, raw silk, skins, carpets and rugs, burlap, cotton, tea, and various other goods.

Ethiopia Italian Says Il Duce

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) The Italian tri-color fluttered from the Palace of Emperor Haile Selassie in half-raised Addis Ababa Tuesday and Premier Mussolini, in a voice trembling with emotion, announced in Rome that peace had come.

A dusty, motorized column of Fascist troops clattered into the Ethiopian capital Tuesday afternoon to end the trail of conquest they began to new seven months ago.

The arrival brought relief to thousands of foreigners. They had been barricaded within the various legations against marauding warriors since Emperor Haile Selassie fled his throne Saturday.

"Ethiopia is Italian," Il Duce shouted at a gigantic Fascist celebration in Rome. "The war is ended. All Italy joined in delirious celebrations when word of the occupation came. Screams and sobs tolled everywhere."

15 Alaska Sailings For Tourists 1936

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 6.—Fifteen sailings to Alaska during the 1936 tourist season are announced by G. A. McNicholl, general passenger agent, Canadian National Steamships. The season will open June 15 and close August 24 with the last sailing to Skagway, George and S.S. "Prince Rupert" will sail on 9-day cruises from the Canadian National dock at 9 p.m. The sister ship, "Prince Rupert," will operate its 7,000-ton S.S. "Prince Robert" in four special 11-day cruises to Alaska. Sailing dates are June 28, July 12, July 24 and August 7. The regular weekly varied to include a call at Sitka, the romantic old Russian capital, a day-long sail through the fjords of the hanging valleys, Gardner Canal and Douglas Channel, and a cruise through scenic inlets past historic Mackenzie Rock via Dean and Burke channels.

Building Boom In Singapore

Singapore, in British Malaya, has had something akin to a building "boom," many new homes and office buildings having been erected, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. The 150 million dollar seven-year Imperial defence scheme is now nearing completion. The scheme includes the construction of a powerful naval base and the heavy influx of defence personnel is causing a shortage of private dwellings.
