TORONTO, Feb. 13 (CP)—Johnny McCormack, the lean centre who was banished recently to Pittsburgh Hornets of the American Hockey League—apparently because he got married during the hockey season—will be back with Toronto Maple Leafs when they play Canadiens in Montreal Thursday.

He'll just make the Feb. 15 deadline for recalling players from the minor leagues.

The Leafs announced they are sending rookie defenceman Hugh Bolton to Pittsburgh. He is expected to be on the shelf for another week because of illness.

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 13—(CP)—Halifax St. Mary's handed the hapless Moncton Hawks their eighth straight loss tonight, defeating the Maritime Major Hockey League cellarites 10-5.

Six Halifax players figured in the team's 10 goals, in a wide open, oft-times ragged contest. Bill Watson with three and Muckle Hollett and Rocky Sullivan, with a pair of goals apiece, were the leading marksmen for the victors.

Little Frank Imonti, goalless for many games, broke into the scoring with a big way in the last two periods tonight, collecting three goals.

St. Mary's took an early lead, rapping in four markers in the first period while Hawks were getting one. Coach Doggie Kuhn of Hawks yanked goalie Les Colvin after the four-goal onslaught, replacing him with Freddie Soller, but the little netminder fared no better than Colvin in the last two frames, being beaten six times.

St. Mary's rapped in four more tallies in the free-wheeling second frame, while Hawks improved on their first period effort and collected a pair.

The team shot four goals in the final frame, Hawks pair coming after St. Mary's had run their total to 10.

Anderson started the scoring at the 4:29 mark of the first period. He was followed by Watson and Hollett. Bessette put Moncton back in the game at the halfway mark but Sullivan scored for St. Mary's before the period ended.

Imonti opened the scoring in the second, but the visitors replied with four more. Sullivan, Watson, Ford and Hollett doing the sniping. Imonti scored again before the period ended.

Brown and Watson made it 10-3 for Halifax in the third period before Imonti and Miller fired a pair for the Hawks ending the scoring.

Neither the New York club nor Raschi disclosed salary figures but sports writers guess that the right-hander had his pay boosted from \$25,000 to \$30,000.

The 31-year-old pitcher had a 21-8 season in '50.

Robinson Favored To Defeat LaMotta Tonight

CHICAGO, Feb. 13 (AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson, world welter king, rules a solid favorite to strip Jake LaMotta of his middleweight crown tomorrow night in the first battle of two champions since the days of Henry Armstrong.

Simplifying the prevailing 3-4 odds, Jake the Bull is a 3 1-2 to 1 underdog in man-to-man betting. It may come down to 2 1-2 to 1 by ringtime at 10:00 P.M. EST.

Some 12,500 fans are expected to pay \$175,000 to see the 15-round match at Chicago Stadium, scene of the Rocky Graziano-Tony Zale thriller four years ago.

Television officials estimate 30,000,000 will watch the CBS telecast. Millions more will hear the CBS radio account of this sixth meeting of these ancient rivals.

La Motta, the cement-jawed "Bull of the Bronx" who never has been knocked off his feet in 95 fights, is the mystery man. Nobody knows his exact weight. Nobody can fathom his pre-fight strategy.

The weigh-in will be two hours before noon, giving La Motta extra time to sweat off suet if needed.

But he amazed the experts by ending his boxing last Friday, five days before the fight, with the explanation that he already was fit.

In case La Motta fails to make 160 pounds by noon, he will lose his title on the scales, says Joe Triner, chairman of the Illinois Athletic Commission, who is the referee.

The fight would go on, but as a non-title match.

However, there is little possibility of this. Triner will tell you off the record that Jake has been under 160 for a "couple of days."

Robinson, expected to weigh 154, holds four victories over La Motta in his five-bout series. However, Jake is the only man to whip him in 123 fights. That happened Feb. 5, 1943, in their second meeting, a unanimous 10-round decision at Detroit.

Twice La Motta had Robinson on the floor, for a nine-count the night he beat the Sugar Man, and for an eight-count three weeks later when Robinson avenged his lone defeat.

CHICAGO, Feb. 13 (AP)—Sid Luckman—eulogized as one of the greatest T-formation American football quarterbacks, today ended his 12-year playing career with Chicago Bears and became a vice-president of the club. Owner coach Halas of the Bears announced Luckman's finish as a player.
