### THE NEWFOUNDLAND QUESTION

It is pleasing to note that Mr. Martin, M. P., has given notice that he will move for an order of the House of Commons for "copies of all correspondence, telegrams, memoranda and all papers in the hands of the Government or any member or official thereof, relating to the admission of Newfoundland into the Confederation of Canada, and also all similar documents relating to any proposals for the establishment of Reciprocal Trade Relations between Newfoundland and Canada." These are matters of prime importance to Canada, as a whole, and to the Maritime Provinces of Canada, in particular. It is to be hoped that the Government will lose no opportunity to promote and conclude negotiations having in view the objects referred to by Mr. Martin. We do not suppose that action in concert with the Mother Country will or can be taken in respect to the closer relationship of Newfoundland and Canada until after the South African war shall have been concluded. But it is well that the pure minds of our politicians and of the people at large should, in the meantime, be stirred up to a proper appreciation of the importance of this matter, to the end that prudent and right action may be taken when the time for action comes. After the South African war, the Newfoundland question will "be in order."

### FARMERS' CO-OPERATION.

We publish today, by special request, an address delivered before the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association on the Co-operation of Farmers. The subject seems to be one of practical importance,—one upon which our farmers may now, or at some more or less distant period, take action. There can be no doubt that co-operation to produce better things is wholly justifiable and commendable. Such co-operation is not of the kind that puts prices up without adding to intrinsic value. It is unlike the commercial combines by which the seller of the raw material on the one hand and the consumer of the finished article on the other are unnecessarily or unjustly deprived of a portion of their legitimate profits or savings. It is a co-operation which, if honestly and efficiently carried out will add greatly to the wealth of the community without injuring anyone. Nor is it socialistic in its tendencies; for each man co-operating has his own personal individual profits and advantages in view. This indeed is the avowed motive of those who co-operate in the production of the dairy industry; and it is the motive which will impel co-operation within the lines set forth in the address which we publish today.

### SCANDALOUS REITERATION OF A FALSE CHARGE.

We did not observe any very strong protests in The Pioneer when Messrs Tarte and Laurier were declaring that the Government of Canada could not and would not send soldiers to assist the Mother Country in her struggle with the South African Republics. We do not remember that The Pioneer objected to the junketing of the Premier at Chicago, while Australia, New Zealand and other colonies were sending out their contingents. But now that Messrs. Laurier and Tarte—having discovered that their thoughtless and disloyal course made them unpopular and was likely to result in loss of votes—are doing their duty as servants of the Crown and Country, the Pioneer is trying to bring condemnation upon those who compelled these gentlemen to a sense of their duty. We should not have objected to the Pioneer's efforts to cover the retreat of its leaders, if it had not at the same time striven to implicate such men as Mr. Gilbert DesRocher, M. L. A., and the mass of our French-Canadian population. The mass of the French speaking people of Canada are without doubt, thoroughly loyal to the great power under which they have enjoyed, to the fullest degree, the incalculable blessing of Civil and Religious liberty. No public man in the Liberal-Conservative party has said or hinted that the mass of the French Canadian people were not loyal. The fact that the French-Canadian people are loyal has been established by the retirement of Mr. Tarte and Sir Wilfrid Laurier from the positions that they at first assumed in respect to Sir Charles Tupper's proposal to send to South Africa a Canadian contingent. The Pioneer's reiteration of the false charge is therefore the more scandalous.

### USELESS AND COSTLY.

The International Commission, which ended in smoke, cost the taxpayers of Canada \$34,600.00. A large part of this sum was spent at Washington. The Ministers drew for expenses as follows: Sir Wilfrid Laurier, \$3,821; Sir Richard Cartwright, \$3,361; Sir Louis Davies, \$2,636; Mr. Fielding, \$200. Mr. Bourassa, the member of Parliament who resigned because he opposed the sending of the contingent, drew in \$2,200 as secretary, and \$1,637 was expended in excursions and dinners. The members of the commission evidently had a pretty good time, and accomplished nothing. The taxpayers of Canada foot the bill.

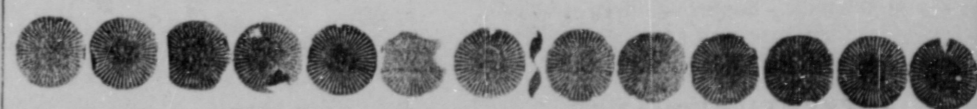
