Willard Kelly Retains Leading Driver Award

Willard Kelly of Southport, well-known island and Maritime race horse owner-driver, was proclaimed the winner of the British Consols Trophy donated by the MacDonald Tobacco Company to the leading driver during the Provincial Exhibition and Old Home Week racing program held here last week.

The presentation was made at the Exhibition Raceway on Saturday night, during the regular weekend night racing card, by Mr. H. J. Kennedy, Vice-President of the Provincial Exhibition Association, the ceremony taking place on the Judges Stand.

Len O'Meara was the runner-up driver and Claude O'Brien was third in the race for leading driving honors.

This is not the first time that driver Kelly has been the recipient of the award, having won top honors last year to make it two in a row, and has been close to winning it on a number of other occasions. Among the horses he drove for his winning performance during the week were his own Nell Kalmuk, Miss Playfair, Little Millie, Yankee Dale, Milldale, and Lucky Number, as well as Lester Johnson's Feather Duster and Judy Kilmuck and Chester Bir's Bonnie Dale. With these horses, Willard finished in the money in nearly every heat he raced.

New Regulations Re Migratory Birds

The Minister of Resources and Development, Ottawa, has just issued the regulations regarding migratory birds for the current year.

A summary of the regulations as they apply to Prince Edward Island follows:

OPEN SEASONS (Both Dates Inclusive)

- Ducks (other than Wood Ducks), October 2 to November 25; Geese (other than Brant), October 20 to December 5; Brant, November 1 to November 30;
- Wilson's Snipe, October 16 to November 15; Woodcock, October 2 to November 8.

Closed Seasons

There is a close season throughout the year on Wood Ducks, Swans, Cranes, all shore birds except Wilson's Snipe and Woodcock, and all migratory non-game and insectivorous birds.

The possession of Migratory game birds killed during the open season is allowed in Prince Edward Island until January 31 following the open season.

Bag Limits

In any day: Ducks (exclusive of Mergansers), 7; geese (including Brant), 5; Wilson's Snipe, 8; Woodcock, 4.

In any open season. Ducks (exclusive of Mergansers), 100; geese (including Brant), 25; Wilson's Snipe, 50; Woodcock, 50.

Possession Limits: 14 ducks, 19 geese, 16 Woodcock.

Guns, Appliances and Hunting Methods

Prohibited: The use of a pump or repeating shotgun with a magazine that can carry more than two cartridges; an automatic (auto-loading) gun; a swivel gun; a machine gun; a battery; a rifle; a shotgun loaded with a single bullet; any gun larger than number 10 gauge; any weapon other than a gun or a bow and arrow; the use of live birds as decoys; the use of any aeroplane, power-boat, sail-boat, motor-boat or nightlight.

No person shall—Shoot migratory birds from a motor vehicle or wheeled vehicle or from a vehicle to which a draught animal is attached;

Have with him for his own use more than one shotgun at any one time while hunting migratory birds.

Hunt migratory birds by the use of or aid of baiting with grain or other materials that may attract migratory game birds;

Shoot migratory birds earlier than one-half hour before sunrise or later than one-half hour after sunset.

The penalty for violation of the migratory bird law is a fine of not more than three hundred dollars and not less than ten dollars, or imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, or both fine and imprisonment.

Yanks Answer Russian Blast On Football

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 (AP)—United States experts said Saturday that major sports teams in Russia are a bunch of pros in amateur guise who are expected to do or die for Uncle Joe by hook or crook.

That was their answer to the recent Soviet radio's propaganda blast at American sportspersons. The Russians pictured American football, for example as an orgy of murder and mayhem.

According to the Russians, American sport is a plot by American capitalists aimed at whipping up "bestial" instincts for a third world war.

This prompted diplomats who have been behind the iron curtain to take a look at football as played in Russia. They say the game there is not what you might think it is. Nor is it always supposed to be what it seems.

If that sounds twisted, consider the facts:

First, what the Russians call football is what Canadians and Americans call soccer.

Second, while the Russians make a great point of their players being non-professional, folks who have been there say the best Russian teams are pros for all practical purposes. A player has a job for an organization for which he plays, but he doesn't work at the job; he just plays the game.

"It can be a championship club and it still can repeat, but I have a sincere doubt that it will do so. 'Nothing is traceable to management. I have utmost faith in it."

"Men who are hungry, men who want to win more than anything else, don't have that complacency."

Wang's time bettered the 2:48.37 turned in last year by Bruce Rich of Petaluma, Calif., who today tropped out at the 20-mile mark.

Radio Moscow Sees Football In U. S. Tough Game

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 (AP)—Radio Moscow is telling Russian listeners that football in the United States is so "murderous" that players in Ann Arbor, Mich., "are often carried from the football field straight to the cemetery."

Ann Arbor is the home of the University of Michigan, which turns out top football teams—but scarcely as tough as the Moscow commentator pictures them.

The broadcast, picked up by American monitors, blamed profit-hungry promoters for the "murderous" play.

The broadcast also put a "barbarous" label on other American sport contests and concluded that it is all part of a dark plot.

The aim, the broadcast said, is to stir up the "bestial instincts" in American youths and get them ready for the new world war "about which the Wall Street bosses are dreaming."

On football, the broadcast had this to say:

"Football players are forced obediently to carry out the orders of their bosses under threat of unemployment. For the men who treat sport as a money-making proposition, people's health and lives are of no concern."

The broadcast also spoke of "the sad fate" of Primo Carnera, former heavyweight boxing champion, at the hands of "the dirty money makers." Everyone knows, the broadcast continued, Carnera returned to Italy "a cripple and a beggar, while a handful of rogues made money for several years running by trading on his health and strength."

Radio Moscow said nothing about Carnera's recent wrestling matches in the United States which are earning him the top purses in the game at present.

Approve 10 World Track And Field Marks

LONDON, Aug. 17 (AP)—Ten track and field marks were accepted as world records by the International Amateur Athletic Federation. Approval came more than a year after many of the marks were established.

The I. A. A. F. said the delayed recognition in many cases was caused by slowness on the part of national authorities in applying for approval.

The oldest mark approved was a 10.2-second timing in the 100-metre dash by Barney Ewell of Lancaster, Pa. This time, which equals the record already shared by Jesse Owens, Hal Davis and Lloyd Lathrop, was made July 9, 1948.

Four of the records were set last year by the University of Southern California relay team of Mel Patton, Ronald Fraser, George Pasquall and Nonnan Stocks. They ran the half-mile in 1:24.4, bettering the old record of 1:26 by Stanford University for both the half-mile and the shorter 800 metres. Later they turned the half mile in 1:24 flat. So today the I. A. A. F. credited them with four records—two for the half-mile and two for 800 metres (about 875 yards).

The same kind of double recognition was given Dick Atlessey Southern California hurdler, who equalled Harrison Dillard's mark of 13.6 for the 110-metre high hurdles in the A. A. U. national outdoor meet last June 24. Since this time also is the record for the shorter 110 yards, Atlessey was given a share of this mark, also held by Dillard.
