

Preparations Being Made For Canadian Open Match

MONTREAL (CP)—The advance guard for the Canadian Open golf championship moved in Sunday over the Pinegrove course for practice rounds in preparation for qualifying play, hopeful of surviving the first week-end process.

There was a whooping field

of 300 listed for today's 18-hole round. From that number approximately 70, with the best scores, will be exempt from the 1st who will start in the first round of the championship proper Thursday.

There are about as many exemptions from qualifying as there are places open. The exemption list includes PGA tournament winners and Canadian pro and amateur champions.

The Sunday amateurs, among those who must qualify, include a number who were on the wrong side of the cutoff at the Insurance Open in Hartford, Conn.

The weather became cloudy Sunday and light rain fell. Forecasts were for partly sunny weather today with the temperature reaching a high of 80.

TOP NAMES ENTERED
The starting field Thursday for the \$50,000 open includes an array of many of the top money winners on the pro golf tour—Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer, Jack Casper, Gary Player, Mike Souchak (Chi. Chi), Rod Figuez and Tommy Jacobs. The defending champion, veteran Doug Ford, is also an entrant.

Canadian pro enterer include tour-travelers George Knudson and Al Balding of Toronto and Al Johnston of Montreal; veteran Stan Leonard of Vancouver; and Pinegrove pro Jack Kay. The Pinegrove course is one of the newest in the Montreal area. It is about 20 miles south of the city and was completed in the spring of 1958.

For the open, Pinegrove's par has been trimmed to 71 from 72, with a change in the 13th hole from a par five to a 460-yard par four. The nines are 38-38 and total yardage is 7,090.

The competitive record for the course is 68, held by pro Jack Bessinger of Val Morin Que., who shot that score in a pro-amateur tournament. Host pro Kay holds the non-competitive record of 68.

Key terms Pinegrove "a test shot course," with a premium on accurately placed drives.

If conditions are good, Kay figures a score of around 274, 10 under par, can win the tournament and top prize of \$7,500.

States Scores Victories
LOS ANGELES (AP) — The United States scored its most decisive victory over Russia in a dual track and field meet Sunday, smashing two world marks in the process, and winning every first race from 100 meters to 10,000.

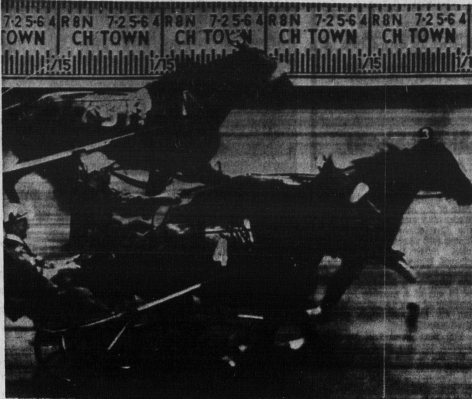
