



COVEHEAD BRIDGE GETS 40-TON SUPPORT

Construction of the new Covehead Bridge is entering the final stages as workmen are moving with all possible speed to have the structure ready at the completion deadline and in time for the influx of summer tourists. The bridge is on the main National Park road from Brackley to Cavendish. The structure collapsed last year from a bearing in heavy seas during a winter storm. Here a 40-ton prestressed beam of reinforced concrete is moved into place on the bridge where it will become part of the spans.

Directed by Ian MacDonald with assistance from Rev. Adrien Arsenault, the play captured the following awards: best production; best director; best visual presentation; best actor (Archie Pletch) and best supporting actor (Ray Doherty).

Best actress award went to Cheryl Shelton of Charlottetown for her role in "The Devil and Miss Appleby", presented by students of Charlottetown Rural High School and co-directed by Mrs. Doreen McEachern and Lynn Tosle.

Two players emerged in a tie for the best supporting actress award. Margo Mitten and Brenda Gallant, who both acted in "Brother Orchid".

Another play by the Charlottetown Rural High students, were deadlocked for this award.

The adjudicator, Mrs. Helen Roberts of Halifax, was high in her praise for the players in "Brother Orchid". Inmate Rehabilitation Takes Outside Help

SUMMERSIDE — The deputy warden of Dorchester Penitentiary said at the annual meeting of the John Howard Society here last night that an inmate returning to society after a penitentiary term without help would likely be placed in prison again.

William Westlake, stationed at Dorchester since last fall and a veteran of 18 years of penitentiary service, told an assembly, "if there isn't anyone or a society to help an inmate returning home when he gets out of prison he will likely be back again. Our purpose (in Dorchester) is not to express anyone. We try to rehabilitate inmates. Around 1948 a vocational training institute was formed to train inmates. We have trained a good number.

"Under our present program we segregate inmates," Mr. Westlake said this was done to separate the old timers who would have a bad influence on younger offenders if kept together. He reasoned that fresh prisoners could be corrected immediately this way.

MEANING OF PROBATION
Vincent MacIntyre, probation officer of P.E.I., explained the meaning of probation. Probation actually is a conditioned liberty, he said. "The main goal is the rehabilitation of the offender. Most offenders must be claimed as useful citizens. Roughly 70 per cent admitted to the penitentiary are second offenders. Roughly 70 per cent on probation do not return to court. There are two functions of probation, pre-sentence reporting—the study of an individual before court, and watch of an 'actual person under probation'."

Slides shown by Mr. Westlake revealed the rehabilitative program at Dorchester. For example, a newspaper "The Beacon" is published by prisoners which enables them to express their views. The public may subscribe to this paper at \$1 per year.

ing, as the royal commission recommended, would not affect existing loans.

Mr. Gordon said the government hopes there will be new chartered banks established. Three bills for incorporation now are before the Commons to incorporate the Bank of Western Canada, the Laurentide Bank and the Bank of British Columbia.

To make it easier for new banks to become incorporated, Mr. Gordon said authority will be sought to issue them charters by letters patent, presumably in the way most commercial enterprises are incorporated under the Companies Act. But in the case of new banks the charters will be subject to upset by Parliament.

CLARIFIES REGULATIONS
In the Bank of Canada Act amendments, the government adopted a royal commission recommendation to clarify the relations between the government and the Bank of Canada on monetary policy, the management of the availability of money and credit to counteract inflationary or deflationary trends in the economy.

Parchment Presented To Rev. T.H.B. Somers

Rev. T.H.B. Somers, MA, STM, DD, minister of the Kirk of St. James, Charlottetown, who was honored by Knox College, University of Toronto, with the degree of Doctor of Divinity on April 27, was presented yesterday with the parchment in connection with the honor bestowed on him.

The simple but impressive ceremony marking the presentation was carried out at the Livingston-MacArthur Nursing Home by Rev. Donald R. McKillican, dean of students at Knox, who was commissioned by the faculty to make the award.

The citation accompanying the award reviews Mr. Somers' background as a student, minister and community leader, and noted "it is a matter of pride and joy to the college that in Mr. Somers we have had an alumnus in whose person the Presbyterian Church in Canada has re-echoed the sacred theology, throughout the Maritime Provinces and beyond, and still more that in him as gifted personality has been offered to the service of the Cross."

Mr. Somers is a native of Toronto, born in 1907, and graduated from the University of Toronto with a master of arts degree in 1938, graduating from Knox College in 1939. An outstanding student, he won a great many awards and scholarships.

In 1941, he received the degree of master of sacred theology, from Union Theological Seminary, New York.

He began his ministry at the Kirk of St. James in 1941. Apart from a short mission service in British Columbia, the Kirk has been his only incumbency.
