Sport Echoes

The bubble reputation, which the R. C. A. F. Flyers had established this fall of being a hockey team that would be a serious contender for Maritime honors next spring, burst with a loud bang at the Bedeque rink last Monday night when the Summerside Aces drubbed them 10-0, and showed pretty conclusively, to this scribe, at least, that the Airmen, as presently constituted, will have to drop to the "intermediate C" classification to make sure of carrying off any kind of honors in Prince Edward Island.

They had, in Rogerson, a goalie as smart as any we have seen in Island intermediate hockey. They had a little fellow called "Pappy" Taylor, who showed quite a bit of hockey ability, as well as coolies of pluck and pugnacity. Taylor took a lot of punishment Monday night, but in the final minutes of the third period he was still trying valiantly to settle scores with big fellows like Carl Woodside and Leo Shields. He hit the deck, a very wet one, at that time more than a dozen times during the game, but always got up to give the windmills another battle in true Don Quixote style. Best of all, he never lost his sense of humor, and was joking with the boys as the game drew to a close. Taylor is a good little hockey player, and one to be admired.

They had a few other boys who may be good when they get into condition, or who may have been good in years that are now past and gone forever, or who have a lot of promise but are just lurching their hockey careers. But in the heat of action, we do not think even an excellent goalie such as Rogerson is, can save them from the blistering attack of the Baglione-Schurman sharpshooters. To hold off the Aces they will have to board up the goalmouth, and cover it with a good grade of asbestos siding.

The R.C.A.F. boys seemed to take their 10-0 pasting like good sports. Outside of one unfortunate incident, they fought cleanly in a losing cause. As far as the incident featuring a savage attack on one of the referees is concerned, we will let the South Shore League executive settle that one. The offense was a serious one, and will probably draw a stiff penalty. We do not believe in sniping too much at the boys who get involved in these unfortunate affairs, however. We all know that in the heat of action hot-headed hockey players will do things that in cooler moments they feel very sorry for.

There is a deplorable tendency towards this roughneck type of hockey in Prince Edward Island, and we suppose, in the other provinces as well. Brawls, rowdyism and a disregard for official control are getting all too common, and if something isn't done to stop it, the better element of fandom will stop going to hockey matches altogether. It's time for the hockey promoters to get together and draw up a new set of stringent rules that will curb this disorder. Offenders should be made to understand that such undesirable actions will result in their expulsion from organized hockey.

Crew of Mercy Plane Rescued

WINNIPEG, (CP) — An RCMP mercy plane lay abandoned in the Northwest Territories barren lands Tuesday night but its three crew members were returning to base in a rescue aircraft after a three-day fight against Arctic cold.

The sick Eskimo they were supposed to pick up at a lonely sub-arctic outpost and take to Churchill, Man., got there before them. He was flown to the Hudson Bay port Sunday by an RCMP Dakota.

The Norseman mercy plane took off from Churchill Saturday on a 400-mile flight to Baker Lake, N. W. T., 1,000 miles north of Winnipeg.

TORONTO, (CP) — Toronto was presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in Canada refused Tuesday to approve a church's call to a minister because it said the salary offered was too small.
