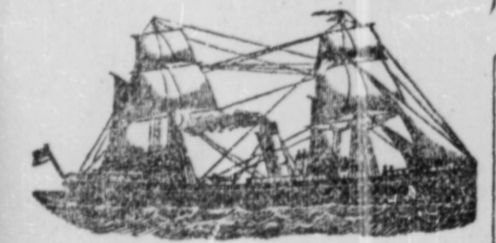

LAKE WINNIPEG IN PORT.

A Valuable Cargo From Charlottetown for Liverpool.

The Beaver Line Steamship Lake Winnipeg arrived from Montreal last night about nine o'clock, but was not docked until this morning. The steamer is now taking in cargo, and it is expected that she will sail for Liverpool early on Thursday morning. Her Charlottetown cargo will include the following:

- 4,000 boxes cheese, shipped by Prowse & Sons, Carvell Bros, Alberton Dairying Company, Horace Haszard, Sylvanus Gault and Nelson Rattenbury. 1250 cases eggs, shipped by Auld Bros and J. A. Farquharson. 1200 packages butter, shipped by Benj Heartz, N. Rattenbury and the Crapanz Dairying Company. 300 barrels apples, shipped by the Fruit Growers' Association, D. Ferguson and John Robertson. 2000 cases canned goods, in lobsters, mutton, etc, shipped by J. H. Myrick & Co, H. W. Longworth and Cogswell & Easton. 100 cases bacon, shipped by B & M Rattenbury. Sundry small lots of parsnips, carrots, oysters, etc, shipped by various persons. 100 tons hay, shipped by Nelson Rattenbury. 100 head cattle, shipped by B. Henderson and E. Wheatley. 1200 sheep, shipped by E. Wheatley, B. Henderson and Carvell Bros. 15 horses, shipped by Benj Heartz. The estimated value of the cargo is \$77,600, made up as follows: Cheese \$24,000 Eggs 4,800 Cattle 5,000 Sheep 5,000 Butter 8,600 Apples 750 Canned goods 13,000 Bacon 9,000 Horses 2,250 Hay 700 Sundries 1,500 Total \$77,600
