HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says an extensive high pressure area centred 200 miles south of Cape Race, Newfoundland, late Sunday evening will continue to feed warm air to all three provinces today.

## Canadian Players Continue To Receive Praise In London

LONDON (CP) — The Canadian Stratford Company continues to receive praise from the critics for its triple bill at the Chichester Festival Theatre.

The Sunday national newspapers are particularly impressed by the company's power as a group — an almost flawless team — and by its mastery of the open-stage technique.

Michael Langham's group had three successive opening nights last week with Shakespeare's Love's Labour's Lost and Timon of Athens and Moliere's le Bourgeois Gentilhomme.

The plays seem an odd collection, says George Seddon in the Observer, but he adds: "The choice is a make sense, however, when you realize that the Canadians have come as missionaries to convert us to the true use of the open stage. In other words, to teach granny to suck eggs with a bit more élan."

## Research Appointments Announced

OTTAWA (CP) — Four new members have been appointed to the National Research Council and four other members have been reappointed, all for three-year terms, it was announced today.

New members are Dr. W. H. Gavvin, manager of the Noranda Research Centre at Pointe Claire, Que., and a native of Paris; Dr. F. F. Lenz, chairman of chemistry at the University of Toronto; Dr. H. R. Robertson, principal and vice-chancellor of McGill University and former surgeon-in-chief at Montreal General Hospital; and Dr. H. E. Saunders, president of the University of Manitoba.

Reappointed are Dr. H. E. Duckworth dean of graduate studies at McMaster University; Hamilton, Dr. F. F. Lenz, chairman, chairman of the Medical Association.

## Cancer Researchers' Report Has Slight Smoker Comfort

CHICAGO (AP) — Cancer researchers came up with a new bit of comforting news for cigarette smokers Saturday.

And they offered some tips for making cigarettes still "safer."

Most filter tip cigarettes now contain less "cancer-inducing properties" than cigarettes formerly did, said Drs. Ernest L. Wynder and Dietrich Hoffmann of Sloan-Kettering Institute, New York City.

In fact, the person smoking a filtered cigarette is exposed on the average to about half as much "tar" and nicotine as the smoker of a regular cigarette 10 years ago, they said.

And there is less of the cancer-inducing material in the remaining tar, if the tobacco has been homogenized, and aerated, they added.

As for tips for further improvement:

A moistened filter is more effective than a dry one in protecting the cilia, the fine hair-like projections on the inner surface of bronchial tubes. Destruction of cilia is thought by some experts to be a first step toward inducing lung cancer.

## July Target Date For Pier

Barring adverse ice and weather conditions, the new pier in Bonaville will be ready by early July, a spokesman for MacNamara of Canada told The Guardian Saturday.

At present there are 30 men and six company officials on the project, and it is expected that 15 more will be on the job by July.

The crew at present is working two shifts of 10 hours each per day and it is expected that if conditions warrant it, three shifts will be used, working round the clock.

The new dock is an important part of the proposed new ferry schedule. With the new schedule, three crossings per day will be made. At present the ferry has to wait if the pier is in use, the new wharf will eliminate this problem.

## 'Melting Pot' Theory Opposed

WINNIPEG (CP) — Gil Molgat, Manitoba liberal leader, said Saturday he can see no reason why English should be the only language of instruction in Manitoba schools.

French and Ukrainian should be considered. "If enough people want it I can see no reason not to allow it," he said in an address to 300 high school students attending a conference on human relations.

Mr. Molgat said he is proud to be called a French-Canadian and does not agree with the "melting pot" theory.

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## MAKARIOS AND EOKA LEADER CONFER

Cyprus President Makarios and Gen. George Grivas, former EOKA leader, conferred Sunday at the home of the general in Athens. While Greek Cypriots were hoping Grivas would be recalled to command their national guard.

Later in an interview general said he was prepared to return to the island and to offer his services, if necessary. President Makarios said "Our aims are common and there is no doubt that on this national issue we all have the duty to help." Grivas broke an agreement which established Cyprus as a republic in British Commonwealth. Grivas wanted union with Greece.

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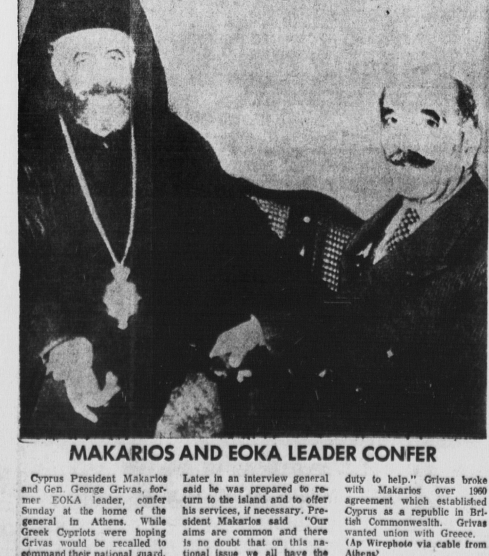
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
