Toledo Has Big Baseball Year

LOUISVILLE, Ky., (AP) — The American Association enjoyed its best road attendance in many years last season, due mainly to the response to Toledo baseball fans to their first pennant winner since 1927.
Four clubs played to 50,000 or more fans at Toledo. Two others drew 40,000 plus attendances and Minneapolis, showing to the smallest total, drew 36,818.
Kansas City's Junior Yankees topped all clubs on the road with a count of 216,257.
Toledo's home attendance of 343,614 was almost 100,000 in excess of Kansas City's runner-up total of 247,556.

Crapaud's New, Modern Rink To Be Officially Opened This Evening

Crapaud rink will be officially opened tonight. This fine new rink is modern in every respect, and is certainly a credit to those who were responsible for its construction.
The rink committee has arranged a program for the official opening tonight with special speakers including Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources; Brig. W. W. Reid, Director of Physical Fitness; W. F. Alan Stewart, M.L.A.; Frank Myers, M.L.A.; and others.
This fine structure has an overall length of 220 feet and width of 95 feet, with an ice space 180x75. The entire building is covered with aluminum. The promenade is constructed to give seating accommodation with elevated standing room around the ice space, and in addition to this there is a balcony.
The dressing rooms, canteen, and office are heated by an oil furnace, forcing the heat in and drawing away the cold air.
The well stocked canteen is equipped with a machine for making french fried potatoes, oil burning range, and electric hot plate. The operation of the canteen by the members of the Crapaud Women's Institute is assurance that capable service will be given.
There is ample parking space for automobiles on either side of the rink.
The present board of directors are: John Nicholson, president; Lloyd Rogerson, vice-president; R. N. Dawson, secretary; John Simmons, William Waddell, Sheldon Howatt, and Melville Bell.
The Crapaud rink company was incorporated in 1948, however, it was not until last spring that the decision was made to proceed with construction.
At a public meeting called in March there was such enthusiasm and support on the part of the people present from all surrounding districts that the decision was made to proceed with building the proposed rink. Mr. Wilfred Maynard of Summerside was in full charge of construction, and company directors said yesterday they were well pleased with the result.
Hockey and skating will, of course, be the wintertime interests at this rink, and already, hockey teams are organizing to play.
The four teams comprising the Crapaud-Victoria board of trade league are Cape Traverse, Parkdale, Milton and Summerside, and their first league game, which is scheduled for this Saturday evening, is between Cape Traverse and Milton.
Lloyd Waddell is president of this league, and Kenneth Madigan and Donald Hart, are vice president, and secretary, respectively.
A meeting in this rink is advertised in this paper for tomorrow (Wednesday) night for the purpose of forming the Intermediate "C" League, with teams expected from Tryon, Crapaud, New Haven, Victoria, Albany, Broadbent, Cape Traverse, Cranee Cove, Green Road, and Kelly's Cross, and rink officials said yesterday that any other eligible teams who were interested, were invited to attend.
A league comprising school teams from surrounding districts will also begin play in the near future.

Firemen Answer Two Calls At Summerside

Two fires within an hour of each other kept Summerside firemen busy yesterday morning.
One of these fires which made rapid progress before an alarm was sounded destroyed the interior of a small frame house on Hanover street in which two people, an elderly man, Mr. James Goss and his son Fred, resided. The son was down town at the time the fire started and at first it was feared that the father, whose sight and hearing are very poor, was a victim of the flames, but the elderly man had somehow made his way from the burning building and in the excitement had been taken to the home of a neighbor. The interior of the building was completely burned and most of the contents of the house were destroyed by fire, smoke and water. The second fire which had occurred an hour earlier, before being brought under control, did some damage to a wall near the entrance to the ground floor apartment of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Gallant in an apartment house on the main highway, just at the outskirts of the town.
Record Christmas Calls Reported
MONTREAL (CP) — Bell Telephone Company reported Monday that Montrealers set a new record for outgoing long-distance calls during the six-day Christmas period which ended Sunday. The company said 23,680 calls were placed to out-of-town centres, 8,342 more than last year. On Christmas Eve 43,633 calls were placed and 43,197 were put through on Christmas Day, both new records.
