SCOTT ACT MEETING IN MARKET HALL LAST NIGHT.
 After repeating the Lord's Prayer by
 Rev. Mr. Coxy and a few remarks by
 Mr. Huggan, the chairman, Rev. Dr. Mc-
 Leod commenced what proved to be
 another excellent array of facts in favor of
 the C. T. Act. The fac-simile of the ballot
 was held to the view of the audience. You
 will see the upper line printed in red—a
 right thing because there is such a thing
 as red rum—and this red backward
 reads murder. Don't forget to put the
 cross at the black line and don't put any-
 thing else or you will spoil the vote.
 He was told by a friend some time ago
 that when the people went out from the
 market it was in a long string of drunk-
 ards, but under Scott Act there is not one
 for every ten who left drunk in those days.
 When we remember the effect of the Scott
 Act has been to reduce the evil by nine-
 tenths surely this is something remark-
 able. Today he had been talking to
 people on the streets and one
 person said he thought that there
 should be no interference with
 that which the law permits to come
 here and takes duty upon. No man has a
 right to become a cellar to store away the
 stuff because the Government allows the
 importation. Some say "I will sell anyway
 and I want to have liberty to do it, and I
 think there are enough fools to help me to
 get it." Someone else has said that he
 would vote for the Act if it were not for
 the fact that the money collected for fines
 goes to Ottawa. Not a cent of the money
 goes out of the city, and whoever told
 him this knew he was telling him an un-
 truth. Therefore you should vote for the
 act because the money is all used here.
 Another said "These men are so defiant,
 what's the use of fighting against them?
 Repeat the Act and let them go." This
 fact ought to make you more determined
 to turn out the rascals. Another said there
 was more liquor sold than under the open
 sale. We got him to admit, however, that
 one man had to shut himself up in a box
 to sell, and therefore could not sell as
 much as if he was able to sell openly, and
 also that others were not able to sell as
 much as when they had keepers at the door to
 admit the buyer. He had found some cold
 and indifferent, but this is a time when
 loyalty to principles should make you rally
 round the flag and help on to victory. Have
 done with any other thoughts but those
 which will cause you to use all the zeal
 and energy possible to bring about the
 result we all hope for. Business methods
 are not much understood by preachers as
 they do not know much about business.
 Modesty might make us say nothing about
 it. But if some business men only knew
 how to live on the salary of a minister
 they would know something more about it
 than they do. If they were in politics they
 would run the country without a run
 shop. The question of revenue made him
 a little mad to think the matter of taxation
 was put down. He would add two ques-
 tions to those who are against prohibition.

A FIGHTING OPPOSITION.
 (Montreal Star)
 The tireless pluck of Canadian Opposi-
 tion is a wholesome sign of our political
 life. No matter how steep or high a hill
 appears to lie between them and success,
 they are always ready to "put up a fight"
 and incidentally to afford the people a
 chance to get rid of the Government if
 they are minded to. When the Liberals
 were in Opposition at Ottawa, they might
 appear to be weary and discouraged be-
 cause of the election; but when the campaign
 came on they went into the fight with vim
 and put the result in doubt from the very
 first. At this distance it is not easy to judge the
 chances of the Prince Edward Island con-
 test, but the fact that they must fight the
 forces at the disposal of two Governments,
 has not dampened the ardor of the Opposi-
 tion in this outlying province. They
 have put up candidates in every division;
 and the people of the island can freely
 choose their rulers for the next four years.
 Here, of course, the Opposition still have
 the memory of long years of power to
 encourage them; for from 1879 to 1893
 the Conservatives held the Local Govern-
 ment in their hands.
 It is a good thing to see an Opposition
 thus ready for the fray. If a party out of
 office owes one duty to the people more
 than another, it is to give them a fair op-
 portunity at election times to punish a bad
 government.

MR. PROWSE'S CHALLENGE.
 Sir,—Mr. Lemuel Prowse has the brazen
 impudence to challenge Mr. Blake as to
 whether he is terrorizing any of the elec-

A By-Law Respecting Milk Vendors.
 Be it enacted by the City Council of the
 City of Charlottetown as follows:—
 1. Every person publicly selling Milk in
 this City in or from any vehicle shall ob-
 tain from the Mayor thereof a License as
 a Milk Vendor and the Mayor is hereby
 authorized to issue such license upon re-
 ceiving the License fee hereinafter men-
 tioned.
 2. The License fee for the present year
 1897 and up to the Thirtieth day of April
 next shall be Fifteen dollars and shall be
 payable on the Twentieth day of August
 next and thereafter the said License fee
 shall be fifteen dollars per annum and
 shall be payable on the First day of May
 in each year.
 3. The City Collector for the time being
 shall be and is hereby appointed Inspect-
 or of all Milk offered for sale in this City.
 4. It shall and may be lawful for the said
 Inspector to examine and inspect all milk
 so offered for sale wherever the same may
 be offered.
 5. It shall by the duty of every person
 keeping or offering Milk for sale whether
 on the streets or in shops or private dwell-
 ings to furnish to and permit the said In-
 spector to take samples thereof for examina-
 tion as analysis, and any person hindering
 the said Inspector in the discharge of his
 duty, or refusing to permit him to examine
 and inspect or to take samples of such Milk,
 shall be deemed guilty of an offence against
 and incur the penalties of this By-Law.
 6. It shall be the duty of the said In-
 spector whenever he has reason to believe
 any milk to be adulterated with water or
 any other substance to procure a sample
 thereof to be analysed and to prosecute all
 persons who may be found selling offering
 or keeping for sale any adulterated Milk.
 7. No person shall expose for sale or
 sell anywhere in this City milk adulterated
 with water or with any deleterious sub-
 stance.
 8. No person shall expose for sale or
 publicly sell Milk in this City in or
 from any vehicle without having first ob-
 tained a License therefor in manner above
 mentioned.
 9. Any person or persons guilty of any
 infraction of any of the provisions
 of this By-Law shall
 upon conviction in the City Court of the
 Stipendiary Magistrate on the oath or af-
 firmation of any credible witness forfeit and
 pay at the discretion of the said Magis-
 trate a penalty not exceeding the sum of
 Thirty dollars for each offence exclusive
 of costs and in default of payment thereof
 it shall and may be lawful for the said
 Magistrate to commit the offender or off-
 enders to the Common Jail of the County
 of Queens County for any period not ex-
 ceeding Thirty days unless the said pen-
 alty and costs be sooner paid, provided
 always that nothing in this By-Law shall
 be construed to require persons selling
 milk in stores or from their private dwell-
 ings to take out the License above men-
 tioned.
