**PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.**

justed. A fairer adjustment of the taxes would receive his support.

The resolution was then reported, agreed to and a bill introduced.

Upon motion of Hon. Mr. Farquharson the House went into committee on the bill imposing an Income Tax. It is provided in the bill that,—

"In estimating the amount of income gains and profits chargeable with Income Tax under this Act, no sum shall be set against or deducted from or allowed to be set against or deducted from such income gains and profits on account of any sum expended for the construction and erection of any house, shop or other building, nor for any sum expended for the permanent or extraordinary repairs or improvement of any house, shop, building or premises, nor for any sum expended for the supply of any implements, utensils, or articles employed for the purpose of any trade, manufacture or concern, nor on account of loss not connected with, or arising out of any trade, manufacture, business, adventure, concern, profession, calling or landlording, nor on account of any capital withdrawn therefrom, nor from any sum employed as capital in any trade, manufacture, adventure or concern, nor for any debts except tax debts."

The bill also gives the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer power to make a charge in the courts against any taxpayer whose affidavit or declaration he considers unsatisfactory.

The bill was under discussion at recess. At the afternoon session committee on the bill amending the Income Tax was resumed.

The bill was discussed by Hon. Mr. Farquharson, Hon. Mr. Gordon, Mr. Shaw, Hon. Mr. McLaughlin, Hon. Mr. Sinclair, Mr. Peters and others.

Hon. Mr. McMillan, in reply to some strictures by Mr. Shaw regarding the method adopted to ascertain the incomes of merchants and other business men, explained that when a doubt existed three or four merchants or other reliable men were consulted in regard to the matter and a tax was imposed in accordance with their ideas.

Mr. Shaw strongly denounced such pimping prying practices.

Hon. Mr. Gordon while not opposed to a fair income tax objected to the measure before the House because it gave too much power to the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer. He moved that the Speaker take the chair.

Mr. Campbell seconded the motion.

The motion was defeated on a party vote.

On the motion that the bill be read a third time tomorrow Mr. Shaw moved an amendment providing that the bill be read a third time three months hence.

Mr. A. A. McLean seconded the motion.

The House divided on this motion which was declared lost on the following division:

The motion that the bill be read a third time tomorrow was then put and carried. House then resumed committee of supply, with Mr. Reid in the chair.

On the item for education Mr. Shaw suggested that the salary of Dr. Anderson

be raised to \$1500 in view of the fact that he would shortly be deprived of the use of the college as a residence. Mr. Shaw spoke highly of Dr. Anderson's work in the interests of education.

Mr. Birch thought that \$1200 was a very good salary for Dr. Anderson.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said the Government might be depended upon to do what was right by Dr. Anderson. That gentleman still occupied the College building, and there was therefore no urgent need of putting anything extra in the estimates for him.

At the evening session Mr. DesRoches spoke in terms of praise of the work done by Mr. J. O. Arsenault, Inspector of French schools, and suggested that his salary as Inspector should be increased to \$250.

Mr. Pineau, Mr. Arsenault, Mr. A. P. Prowse, Mr. A. A. McLean and others also favored the suggestion of Mr. DesRoches.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said it was a matter for the Executive to deal with at the end of the year or next year. The government would do what was right by Mr. Arsenault.

The item as submitted passed the House.

On the item for the administration of Justice there was a long debate regarding the enforcement of the Scott Act, in the course of which it was pointed out that no return of moneys collected appeared in the Public Accounts.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson promised to table a full statement upon this point.

On the item for the Hospital for the Insane, Hon. Mr. Farquharson called attention to an article in THE EXAMINER regarding the issuing of debentures for the asylum annex, which he claimed was not correct. The Government had not issued debentures for that work as stated. The debentures authorized last year had not been issued. He also spoke in terms of praise of Dr. Goodwill, the new Medical Superintendent, and pointed out some of the changes made in that institution recently.

Regarding the article in THE EXAMINER referring to the debentures it was pointed out by Hon. Mr. Gordon and Mr. Shaw that when Mr. Peters applied to the House for permission to borrow \$75,000 he gave out that \$25,000 of that amount was for the asylum annex. But when the House met next year they found that the money had all been spent and there was not one lick of the annex laid.

After some further discussion the item passed.

On the item for exhibitions Hon. Mr. Gordon and others on the Opposition side of the House put in a plea for County exhibitions. It was suggested that \$2000 of the \$6000 set down for a central exhibition at Charlottetown be divided between King's and Prince Counties, \$1000 to each. But if this were too much to expect a smaller sum would be thankfully received.

The suggestion was not acted upon and the item as submitted passed.

Other items in supply were then considered, and after midnight all the resolutions were reported agreed to and the House adjourned.

**KENSINGTON CHEESE FACTORY.**—An esteemed correspondent at Kensington writes: "The Kensington cheese factory has been enlarged this year to meet an anticipated increase of the milk supply. The increase is here—24,364 pounds to-day (Monday) 33 cheese made; increase of over same day last year, 4,465 pounds. The curing room has now capacity for 1,000 cheese and the working room has space for 8 vats—6 vats are provided now and another goes in later on, with 4 twelve-hoop presses in place." Well done.
