No New Developments In S'side's \$400 Theft

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
Town police last night reported there were no new developments in their investigation into the theft of more than \$400 Sunday night.

The large sum of money was contained in a purse, which was taken from the home of Tossant Perry, 384 Market Street, sometime between 11.30 and midnight Sunday night.

Miss Clarice Perry, an employee of Andy's Downtown Restaurant, and to whom the purse belongs, had taken the money, which was part of the restaurant cash, to the house for safe keeping and left it in the living room. She returned to the restaurant to pick up Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Savident whom she was to drive to their home.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Tossant Perry returned to her house and found both the outer and inner doors open.

Miss Perry came back about 10 minutes later and found that the purse had been taken.

Three police officers who were on night duty, started a search for the purse which they thought the thief or thieves might have thrown away, but at a late hour last night it had not been located.

Police believe that the theft was planned in advance and that it was committed by a person or persons who knew that Miss Perry would be taking the money home, which she had been doing for the last couple of weeks.

The thieves apparently wasted no time in taking the money and were quite silent in their efforts

as the two Perry children were upstairs at the time and heard nothing and their dog also failed to raise an alarm.

Also contained in the purse was some cash belonging to Miss Perry, the keys to the restaurant, insurance papers, bank books, and other business papers.

Rams' Gillman To Be Released

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Coach Sid Gillman of Los Angeles Rams profession football team will be out at the end of the season, The Herald-Express said Monday.

His contract, which has a year to run at a reported \$25,000 annually, will be ended by mutual agreement, said a story by sports writer John B. Old.

The story said neither Ram officials nor Gillman would confirm a split. But it said close friends of Gillman said he will welcome a showdown.

The Rams, regarded before the season as pennant contenders, have a 2-8 record. If they don't win their two remaining games, this season will be their worst since they came here in 1946.

Two teams in the new American Football League reportedly are interested in Gillman, Old wrote.

Gillman's over-all record since coming here in 1955 from Cincinnati University is 26-30.

NEW YORK (AP)—Hoodlum Frankie Carbo was sentenced Monday to two years in the penitentiary on his plea of guilty to an undercover role in professional boxing.

Carbo, 53, long tabbed as the underworld czar of professional boxing, had pleaded guilty Oct. 30 to three counts of a 10-count indictment.

He pleaded guilty to one count of conspiracy, one of acting in a boxing match as a manager without a licence and one of acting as a matchmaker without a licence.

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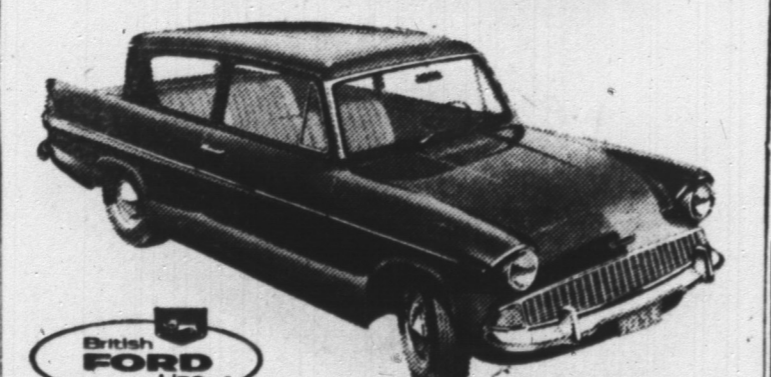
