

Anti-War Program Outlined By American Ambassador

GENEVA (AP) — United States Ambassador Arthur Dean outlined the transition disarmament conference here in an anti-war program that included, among other ideas, a direct telephone line connecting President Kennedy and Premier Khrushchev.

Dean urged the delegates to consider the proposals during the forthcoming Christmas recess and to name technical military groups to study them further.

Basically, the U.S. plan aims at ensuring all powers that other nations are not secretly mobilizing against them and at preventing the world from slipping into war through diplomatic miscommunication or failure of communications.

TABLES DOCUMENT
His 15-page document was introduced as a working paper and contains these concepts:
1. Governments should give advance notification of major military movements to allay suspicion of aggressive aims.
2. Permanent observation posts should be installed at key traffic points to offer another safeguard against illegal mobilization. The posts would be supplemented by observation by aircraft, mobile ground teams or overlapping radar systems.
3. The major powers should exchange military missions as a confidence-building measure.
4. Communications links between major ground teams should be installed to prevent war by miscalculation. The Kennedy-Khrushchev telephone would be one of these.
5. Studies should be undertaken on the possibility of teaching major powers themselves tactics of a war.
6. Experts should investigate related areas, including a study of modern weapons technology and the publication by countries of all steps they had taken individually to prevent war by accident.

Alberta Farmer Fails In Battle Over Bull

LONDON (CP) — Alberta rancher James Rave has conceded first-round defeat in the battle of the Charolais bulls, but says doggedly the fight is far from over.

The unsparring center of the argument is quiet-mannered Bebe, a six-month-old pedigree Charolais buller flown in from Canada to be artificially mated to one of 26 French Charolais bulls in Britain.

But British agricultural authorities—probably under pressure from British breeders—refuse to allow any transatlantic "marriage of convenience," they say the Charolais bulls are for cross-breeding experiments only.

Rave, breeder from Strome, Alta., told a reporter Wednesday that the real reason for British resistance is that "they are scared to death" of the Charolais breed.

SUPERIOR BEE
"The fact is that the Charolais is superior to any beef animal in the world," says Rave, who accompanied Bebe on Tuesday's freight-plane flight from Montreal. "The British breeders know that and they are scared."

Rave had a meeting Tuesday night with Scott Hopkins, deputy British Minister of agriculture, and came away surprised that the minister's "very determined" stand against allowing outside use of the Charolais semen.

Rave said he plans to keep on trying to get an outside infusion of Charolais blood, "even if we're defeated here."

He plan to bring over another shipment of Charolais cattle in January. If he win, the end result will be terrific.

Charolais blood, Rave says, is getting "very, very thin" in Canada, and an outcross from the British-domiciled French bulls is highly desirable.

House Briefs

Federation of Agr. Is Described Spokesman, Watchdog

One of the main purposes of the Federation of Agriculture is to exert influence, usually on governments, for the development of policies beneficial to agriculture and for the general good. Over a period of 25 years the federation at both national and provincial levels has endeavored at all times to act in a responsible manner to the end that it's requests would not create hardship for other groups.

To a large extent federation progress rests in its ability to work in harmony with whatever government may be in power. This does not mean that they will always be complete harmony and to assure the government the right to disagree is a basic part of democracy. With these thoughts in mind we should not be accused of bias or partially in extending to the government congratulations on the fact that the majority of the electors reposed their confidence in it and to assure the government of the federation's co-operation and assistance in the interest of agriculture. Again we point out the federation's role of spokesman and watchdog for agriculture and its policy of maintaining independence of action.

FEDERATION WORK
Increasingly it becomes apparent that different groups of producers are looking to the Federation of Agriculture for assistance in getting organized in order that they may more effectively represent their own interests. For the last year the federation has worked with the beef producers, the tobacco growers and the growers of the poultry and egg producers and the growers of freezing foods to assist them.

This sort of work can be justified on two scores first of all it is a trade which offers advantages to the group being organized and secondly there is a strengthening of the federation through a more complete representation of agriculture provided of course, new groups decide to associate themselves.

In some quarters it has been suggested that similar results could be obtained by the federation devoting its staff to committees to be especially concerned with different commodities. This sort of arrangement would get around the fragmentation of agriculture into so many different groups.

In this small province few groups can have the resources to support an office staff on a full time basis. More and more this is a handicap to the effective work of such groups. The day is gone by when any sort of an organization can be conducted effectively from a living room table.

While there are some difficulties there is nevertheless much to be said for centralizing in one office more and more of the activities of more and more groups. Some of the advantages are obvious, the availability of stenographic service, an established place of contact, knowledge of what each group is doing in the interest of avoiding conflict.

However, this sort of arrangement is not necessarily the best as is evident at the moment. Service provided by the central office is better than that which is available in the provinces which ever present a problem with practically all farm organizations there is a tendency to be lacking. The potato industry has been divided for years on the question of compensation in marketing and of regulation. There does not appear to be any effective compromise and the answer unpalatable though it may be lies in the direction of setting up the game with those who break the rules being penalized.
