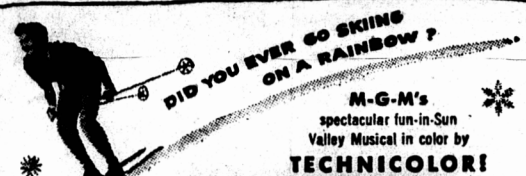

NEWSPRINT PRODUCTION MONTREAL, Oct. 17 — (CP) — Canadian newsprint production in September amounted to 437,579 tons, an increase of 22,400 tons over the corresponding month last year, the Newsprint Association of Canada reported today.

Canadian shipments for the same month were 485,165 tons, an increase of 47,507 tons over September last year. U.S. consumers accumulated 88.1 per cent of the shipments, an increase of 13.6 per cent over the same month last year.

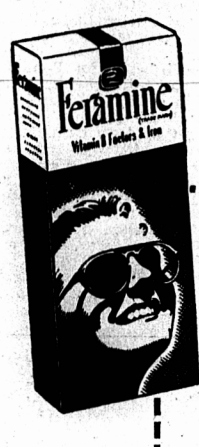

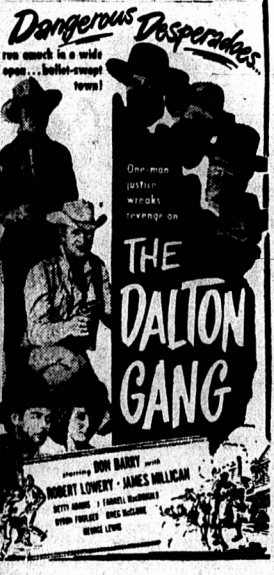

(Continued from Page 1) throughout a unified Korea. American intelligence officers said they believe the North Korean commander, Kim Il Sung, may withdraw his seasoned veterans, replacing them with raw, newly-conscripted youths, in a bid to save the tough core of his army to fight another day.

The spectacular U. N. advances of the last two days closed the trap on Pyongyang earlier than observers had predicted. The main battle for the capital was expected within 24 hours.

The South Korean 1st Division, led by General Paik Sun Yu—himself a native of Pyongyang—was in the vanguard of the advance on the North Korean capital.

The veteran division pushed ahead 30 miles throughout Tuesday to within 12 miles of Pyongyang after dark.

Paik's troops at times had to be restrained from breaking into a trot. They paused only to catch their breath.

One tanked column of the Republican 1st Division and another infantry force linked at nightfall at Sangwon, about 20 air miles southeast of Pyongyang. They clipped off another eight miles before halting.

Equally determined to keep a distinguished record of "firsts" in fact, the U. S. 1st Cavalry Division sent a 30-mile-long column of tanks, motorized troops and supplies rolling along the primary highway to Pyongyang.

Maj.-Gen. Hobart R. Gay's troops had been first into Manila and first into Tokyo. They were first to link up the Pusan and Inchon beachheads south of the 38th parallel.

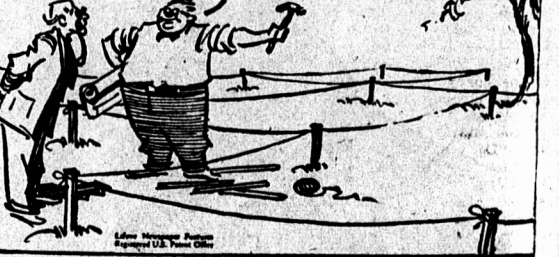
