SUPREME COURT.

TUESDAY, Nov 27.

Richard vs Mattinson—The court delivered judgment to-day. This was a rule nisi to set aside a bailable writ issued after the death of the late Sheriff Gaffney and directed to the Sheriff of Prince County and executed by the Deputy Sheriff. The court held unanimously that the writ was regular and discharged the rule with costs refusing to discharge the defendant from Prince County jail where he is at present confined. Ronald McMillan vs. City of Charlottetown. This is an action of damages for alleged neglect of the firemen of the city to extinguish a fire on plaintiff's premises. Argument on the defendant's demurrer as to right of plaintiff to bring this action. F L Haszard Q C, and Morson, Q C, for defendant; McLeod, Q C, and Stewart Q C for plaintiff.

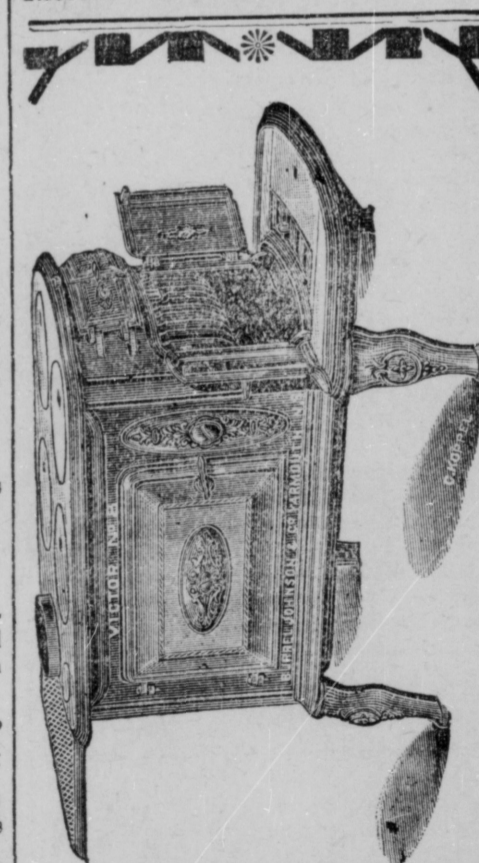

Its area, population, resources, modes of conveyance, manners and customs of the people, etc., were described, and at the close of his discourse Mr. Arsenault answered questions put to him by several gentlemen in the audience. The lecture was illustrated by views showing many of the points of interest in South Africa, in addition to which pictures of Major Weeks and the Island contingent were projected. Upon motion of Mr. T. C. James the thanks of the large audience were conveyed to Mr. Arsenault by Mr. Shaw, who presided, and the National Anthem closed the proceedings.
