Documents, Coins Placed In Stone

There were a number of documents, also a number of coins placed in the corner stone of the old West Kent School which has just been demolished here. The Guardian was told last night. Byron Burns, Great George Street Jeweller, who is an historian and a bit of an antique collector in his own right, quoted from an old Island newspaper of 1858 as he told something of the ceremony 107 years ago. The story said that the foundation stone of the new school building "on Western Kent Street was laid on Monday morning" the date was April 29—"at 11 o'clock".

The ceremony was preceded by a parade of pupils from the various city schools, headed by Galbraith's band. Lieutenant Governor Sir Robert Hodgson delivered "a very

happy speech", the old story says, "after which he descended from the platform and finally laid the foundation stone." Continuing the old story said "Under the stone was a cavity in which were deposited one copy of all the Island papers a list of the school trustees and several coins, and some other documents." The story ended with "the proceedings were ended by God Save the Queen." The explanation given in this paper this week is that the cork of the bottle had deteriorated and had newspapers and other documents "were reduced to a black mush and of no value." If this is all that was found, the question in which several coin collectors expressed is "what happened to the coins?" They wouldn't dissolve from dampness, was the observation.

Former Professor Is Guest Speaker

A former professor at St. Dunstan's University, Dr. Herbert Johnston, will be guest speaker at the annual lecture series to be held in the Alumni auditorium at SDU on Monday and Tuesday, April 18 and 19, it was learned last night.

On Monday night, Dr. Johnston will speak on the subject "Business and Professional Conduct," and on Tuesday his topic will be "Labour, Management and the Common Good." Both lectures will begin at 8 p.m. and are open to the public. There is no admission charge. Dr. Johnston, since 1948 an assistant and associate professor of philosophy at the University of Notre Dame, South Bend, Indiana, served as an instructor in the English and philosophy departments at SDU from 1938-46.

A native of Montreal, he received his Bachelor of Arts degree from St. Michael's College, University of Toronto, in 1932, and his teacher's certificate from the Ontario College of Education the following year. He then taught for two years in Regiopolis College, Kingston, Ontario, after which he attended the Pontifical Institute of Mediaeval Studies, University of Toronto, receiving his Master of Arts degree in 1936 and his PhD in 1938.

On completion of his PhD studies, Dr. Johnston taught for eight years at SDU before going

to Aquinas College, Grand Rapids, Michigan, as professor of philosophy and head of the philosophy department. After two years at Aquinas College he accepted his present position at the University of Notre Dame. Dr. Johnston has several publications to his credit, including two books, "Business Ethics" and "A Philosophy of Education." His articles have appeared in numerous publications, such as "The Modern Schoolman," "The New Scholasticism," "Catholic Educational Review," "Philosophical Studies," "Thought Patterns," "Ave Maria," "Lutheran Scholar" and Community "Education."

An article also appeared in the book, "An Etienne Gilson Tribute," and three of his articles will be printed in the forthcoming edition of "The New Catholic Encyclopedia." Dr. Johnston arrived in Prince Edward Island yesterday and will be here for about a week. During his stay he will be residing at SDU.

N.S. Bishop Has Arrived

The Rt. Rev. W.W. Davis D.D., Bishop of Nova Scotia with jurisdiction in Prince Edward Island, is currently visiting some of the parishes of the Anglican Church in this province. The Bishop will conduct confirmation at St. John's Church, St. Eleanor's and at the RCAF Chapel at Summerside on Thursday and Friday evenings respectively, and at Kensington on Saturday evening with a Youth Conference there in the afternoon. Bishop Davis will come to Charlottetown and Georgetown on Sunday to hold confirmations. These services will take place in the city churches, St. Paul's and St. Peter's on Sunday morning at 11 and at 7 in the evening and at Holy Trinity Church, Georgetown at three in the afternoon. On Monday the Bishop will be the guest-speaker at a men's supper sponsored jointly by the Laymen's Associations of St. Peter's Cathedral and St. Paul's Church. This will take place at the Y.M.C.A., Charlottetown.

His lordship will be the celebrant at a service of Holy Communion at 10 a.m. Tuesday in St. Peter's Cathedral. This will mark the beginning of the annual sessions of the Diocesan Church Society and the Diocesan Women's Auxiliary. He will also be present at the later meetings of the W.A. and D.C.S. and will preside as chairman on the latter occasion.

The sad circumstance of the death of Archbishop J.T. Ibbot will bring the Bishop to Charlottetown at the beginning of his visit in order that he may officiate at the burial service today in St. Paul's Church.

Bishop Davis will return to Halifax on Wednesday morning, April 20th.
