

Ch'town Council Seeking Delay In Passage Of Bill

City Council has asked the Legislature to delay action in the passing of a bill entitled "An Act to Relieve the Payment of Certain Taxes in More Than One Area" until such time as representatives of the Federation of Prince Edward Island Municipalities meet with the Legislature.

A resolution to this effect was unanimously passed at the regular monthly meeting of the City Council held in the council chambers last evening.

Councillor Gormley touched off the debate when he noted that it would be a great loss to the city if non-residents of the City did not have to pay educational tax or non-resident tax.

Councillor Gormley went on to say that with the number of major jobs that had to be performed this year the non-residents of the city would have an advantage over the city resident if he was allowed to work in the city without charge.

"I don't approve of it at all. What will happen is that next year you will probably have to get a relief system going. A man with five children can't get enough to pay for his family working at 80 cents an hour."

A resolution granting the request of the Commanding Officer of HMCS Queen Charlotte that the new Navy site located

at the corner of Haviland and Water Street be called "Navy Quay" was also unanimously approved by the council.

WANTS SURVEY
Councillor Gaudet asked permission of the Council members to contact one of the gentlemen who did a tax office survey of Moncton and Halifax in regard to the estimate of doing a spot survey of Charlottetown.

Councillor Gaudet stated that to give an estimate the surveyor may need to come down to the Island and this might cost money. For this reason he said he wanted the full approval of the Council.

A correspondence from the Charlottetown Board of Trade is stated that the Board had passed a resolution approving the renewal study of Urban Charlottetown.

Other correspondence received dealt with letters from the Protestant Family Service Bureau and the Knights of Columbus regarding the favoring of a brief urging a rehabilitation centre for alcoholics; a letter from a resident of the City Police congratulating the City Police in their promptness in recovering a large portion of \$70 which was taken from her wallet in her apartment last week, and also for apprehending the juvenile responsible; a petition from residents of Park and Beech

Streets regarding sewer facilities.

In another letter submitted to council was a statement from Dr. R.G. Lea asking that Constable Hugh MacKinnon be relieved from all duties on the active police force due to a heart condition.

In presenting the report of the police committee Councillor Gormley stated that there was no future employment for Constable MacKinnon on the active police force.

'The Mousetrap' Winds Up Drama Festival Presentations

The Little Theatre Guild of Charlottetown presented "The Mousetrap" as the fourth and final of a series of plays in the P.E.I. Island Regional Festival of the Dominion Drama Festival, in the auditorium of Prince of Wales College last night. More than 600 persons were in attendance.

The play was written by Agatha Christie and directed by George Anderson. The adjudicator, Richard Ainley, in commenting on the performance said he was again reminded of lack of space on stage. He praised the appearance of the set and described how more distance could be obtained by slight alterations. He was favourably impressed with the directed blackout and music.

There was a good deal of hesitancy which the Director might tone up. "Watch and listen, don't hustle," was his advice to all concerned. More clarity and distinction were required and many slurred words were in evidence.

Corena Steele as Mollie Ralston could not be heard clearly at first but warmed up later. She had the unpleasant task of starting and carrying on the burden of pace. Grace and movement were lacking.

Weston Carmody as Giles Ralston "I think he should stand up and be more affectionate."

Eric MacGregor as Christopher Wren "showed a good deal of skill; I would like to see him in another role," the adjudicator said.

Barbara Rogers as Mrs. Boyle "did right well. An unattached female of the old stock character does help her." She lacks confidence yet.

Lloyd Yeo as Major Metcalf did not have much to go on, did not assert authority.

Brenda Large as Miss Casewell is very young did good and has charm.

Peter Shama as Mr. Paravivini

"is obviously a good actor but he should not work so hard. I enjoyed watching him," the adjudicator said.

Immediate Start On Chignecto Canal Is Urged

OTTAWA (CP)—A New Brunswick senator, with the support of a Quebecer, Monday night urged the government to make an immediate start on the "eastern terminus of the St. Lawrence Seaway"—the Chignecto Canal.

Senator Austin Taylor (L-New Brunswick) said the canal, which would link the Bay of Fundy and Northumberland Strait, is the key to future development of the Maritimes. His appeal for con-

struction of the canal was backed by Senator Jean-Francois Pouliot (L-Quebec).

The Chignecto proposal grew out of a debate on the St. Lawrence Seaway that was marked earlier this session by an appeal from Senator Harold Connolly (L—Nova Scotia) to Maritime senators to unite against granting the seaway authority additional borrowing powers.

Support for Senator Connolly's stand was voiced by Liberal senators Gordon Innor, Nova Scotia, and G. P. Burchill, New Brunswick, after their leader, Senator W. Ross Macdonald, Senate Opposition leader, took issue with anti-seaway senators.
