

Letter Carrier Service Delayed

Summerside residents will not have door to door postal delivery before the election as expected, it was learned from the Summerside post office department yesterday.

Everything here is ready as far as the post office is concerned except for training the carriers which will require at least a week before delivery is started. The post office has received the new equipment necessary to begin the service.

All residents who have installed either a mail box or a mail

slot in the door and have notified the post office are eligible for delivery.

Eight carriers are to be trained for the job which will extend to St. Eleanors. All will be dressed in the traditional postal carrier garb.

Large green boxes on the street corners are being seen for the first time. They are the parcel boxes used by the delivery truck. The town will also have its first red box for depositing parcels and papers.

Service should start within a week following the election, it is expected.

S'side Fire Hydrants Getting Bright New Coat Of Paint

SUMMERSIDE — Summerside fire hydrants are getting the "once over" this week, as painter John Boates tickles their arms with his brushes.

The fire hydrants, whose paint has faded, haven't been painted for three years. The tri-colored hydrants, newly painted, add gaiety and color to Summerside avenues and streets. John Boates began his painting Tuesday and yesterday had completed Water, Central and Summer streets.

The "steamer" hydrants (those with three outlets), in their new color jackets, have yellow bodies with red "arms" and black trim. Hydrants with just two outlets are being painted with red bodies and yellow "arms," with black trim.

Summerside Fire Chief Leo Wood explained that the bright yellow bodies of the "steamer" hydrants make them easy to see, and also help to distinguish between the two types of hydrants.

Town Manager J. A. Brophy stated that the fire hydrants are painted every three years, and the yellow with the red, besides serving a useful purpose, is the color used on most town vehicles.

"The Pegged Dollar"

A FULL DOLLAR AT HOME A TRADING DOLLAR ABROAD A BOON TO ALL CANADA

LAST year—in order to boost Canada's trade abroad and encourage sales of made-in-Canada goods at home—the Diefenbaker Government discounted Canada's trading dollar.

This step was cheered by the **Canadian Congress of Labour** which said, in a brief to the Government, "The Congress also notes with satisfaction the continuing increase in export trade... we believe Canada is justified in following an exchange depreciation policy."

The **Senate Manpower Committee** approved. It attacked the Liberal premium-dollar policy, pointed out that it "operated to the disadvantage of our export industries and has also an adverse effect on Canadian industries selling in Canadian markets."

Mr. Walter Gordon, Liberal brain-truster, wrote a book on Canada's economy. He recommended pegging the dollar and is quoted as saying, "Two basic essentials are to cut rates of interest here in Canada and lower the value of the Canadian dollar in relation to the U.S. one."

At its last convention in Ottawa, the **entire Liberal Party** supported the policy of pegging Canada's dollar.

Canada's dollar is the same at home as it was before it was pegged. **The Prime Minister has said**, "The external rate of the Canadian dollar, whether at premium or discount, is completely different and distinct from the domestic dollar—the dollar you use to support yourself and your family—that dollar is still a one-hundred cent dollar."

But abroad, it is a more competitive dollar. It will help sell made-in-Canada products—from the factories, the farms, from Canada's fishing, mining and lumbering industries. And Canada's tourist industry, which under the Liberals fell into a multi-million dollar deficit position, is swiftly moving into a surplus position.

Why are the Liberals now attacking the pegged dollar? Purely for political purposes... the election. Prime Minister Diefenbaker is right: it is their policy "to rule Canada or ruin it."

When the Liberal Party ruled Canada, it stood for tight money, high taxes, huge trade deficits abroad. Canadian industry was driven to the wall because of the flood of foreign goods into Canada. Wheat was piled to the sky on the farms in Western Canada. Thousands of Canadians lost jobs and income as a result of Liberal policy.

In 1954, Canada's trade unions marched on Ottawa and informed the Liberal Government there were 500,000 unemployed in the Nation, even though the labour force was much smaller than today's. The Liberals did nothing.

Three years later, they were thrown from office.

The new Conservative Government put an end to tight money; it held the line on inflation, keeping down the cost of living. It reduced taxes so that 85% of Canadians today are paying less income tax than they would have under the last Liberal tax schedule.

Fifty percent of the wheat surplus has been sold. In 1961, Canada had its first trade surplus in many years.

More than 500,000 new jobs have been created for Canadians.

The people of Canada are now moving into one of the greatest eras of expansion in our history. Pegging the dollar is a big boost to Canadian employment, production and trade.

After 4½ years of decisive action, the Government of John Diefenbaker has finally ended Liberal tight money, Liberal inflation, Liberal trade deficits—and it has beaten back the Liberal recession.
