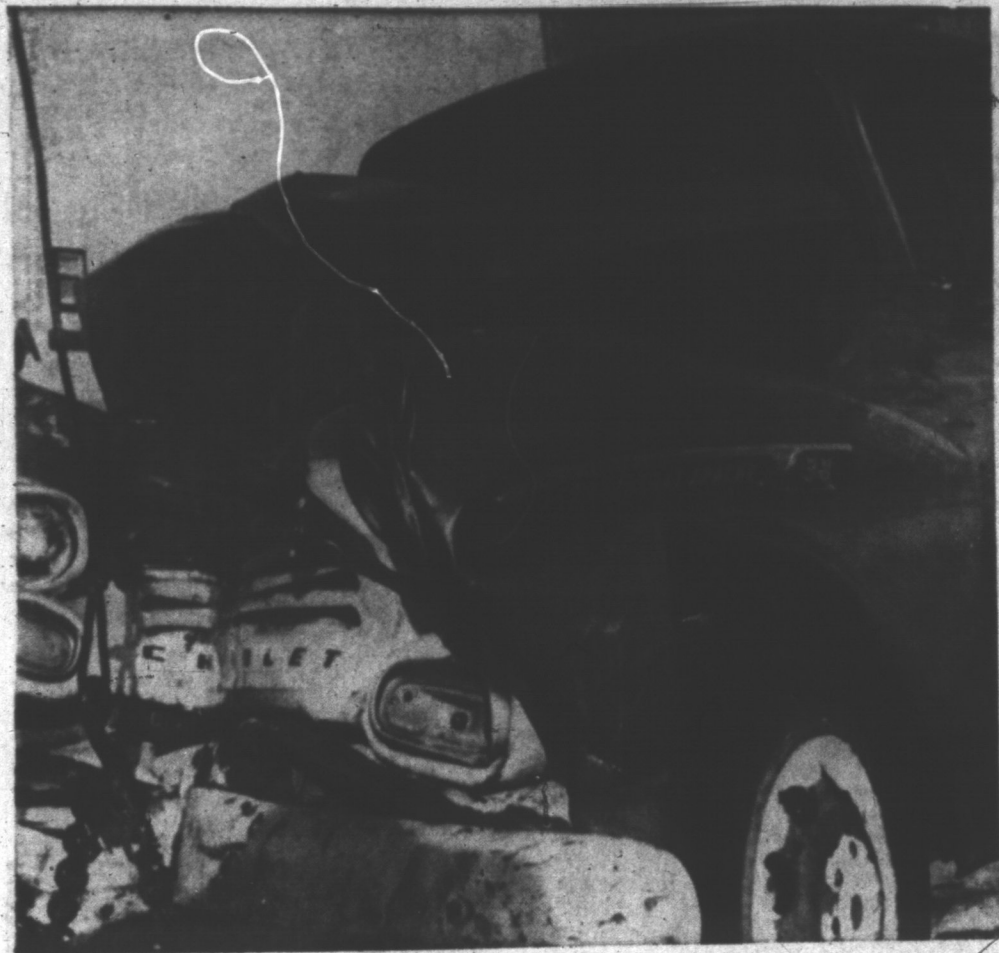


S' side Has Big Increase In Residential Building

(Continued from page 1) and the number of such tourist parties — 64,493 — meant 231,077 people came to the province from other places in Canada or the United States. There were a few from other parts of the world.

PARTY SPENDS \$130

A camp survey by tourist officials in 1960 indicated that each tourist party in the province spent \$130 and it was by using this figure that the income from the tourist industry for 1961 of \$8,384,000 was reached.

New Brunswick furnished approximately one-quarter of the tourists, with 7,954 of the total 31,211 automobiles. Nova Scotia with 4,706, was slightly ahead of Ontario with 4,369.

Other provinces were all represented with Quebec sending 3,268 followed by Alberta with 111; Newfoundland 93; Manitoba 91; British Columbia 75; and Saskatchewan 50.

As usual the greatest number of cars from the United States were from Massachusetts with 2,995. The newer states of Hawaii and Alaska, were not represented last year but all others were.

The next largest number came from New York with 1,242, Connecticut sent 1,091; Maine 725; New Hampshire 550.

From other states 235 came from California; 226 from Florida; 241 from Maryland; 184 from Illinois. The other Pacific Coast states of Oregon and Washington sent 11 and 16 respectively.

During the period from January to October the Travel Bureau had 36,395 inquiries from adults—an increase of 7,542 over the similar period of the previous year. Inquiries from children also rose to 8,009 from 6,999.

UNUSUAL ASPECTS The travel habits of tourists reveal some unusual aspects in that those coming to the province via the Borden route arrive in greater numbers in July, while on the Wood Islands route more people come in August. A possible reason is that more Nova Scotians come in August for Old Home Week.

With magazine and news paper advertising inserted in tourist markets by the Travel Bureau 'keyed' in such a way as to enable the bureau to determine which advertisement prompted an inquiry some of the results are interesting.

It has been learned that more inquiries came from people reading the advertisement in Reader's Digest than any other medium. Following it were results obtained from ads in Life, MacLean's and National Geographic.

Greatest response from newspaper advertising came from readers of Montreal La-Press, closely followed by New York Herald Tribune. Trailers were Montreal Star and Toronto Globe and Mail, Boston Herald Tribune, Toronto Telegram and Boston Globe.

DEMERIT POINTS The Provincial Secretary also revealed that to the end of October last year 3,466 drivers had accumulated demerit points on their driving records and 42 licenses had been suspended.

New Approach Is Forecast To Attract Industries Here

One of the main items to come up at the Legislative Assembly in February will be a complete revision of the province's industrial development legislation. It was learned yesterday.

The minister of industry and natural resources, Hon. Leo Rossier said that he believes efforts to amend or revise the existing legislation are futile and that a fresh approach, more in keeping with the times, is called for.

It was pointed out that the Industrial Estates program now in use in Nova Scotia will be given consideration, but this may not entirely meet the specific needs of the province.

The Industrial Promotion Act and the Industrial Corporation Act will be given careful study in an effort to find ways in which they can be improved.

Pointing out that industrial development is no longer a matter of choice, Mr. Rossier says that he feels that Prince Edward Island has the opportunity of attracting a number of new industries if modern methods are used.

Acadia Hoopster Ruled Ineligible

WOLFVILLE, N.S. (CP) — Warren Sutton, considered the top basketball player in the Maritimes, has been ruled ineligible and will be unable to play with Acadia University Aztecs in intercollegiate play this season.

Sutton, a sharp-shooter who led Acadia to the championship of the annual Blueview invitational tournament in Halifax this week, was ruled ineligible by the Maritime Intercollegiate Athletic Union.

The ruling was made because Sutton has played four years of college basketball. Four years is the limit under MIAU rules.

Sutton played two full seasons at Alfred University in New York state. In his third year at Alfred he played only one game. Last season he played with Acadia. The one-game in 1960 qualified for a full season under MIAU rules.

Acadia coach Stu Aberdeen said he had appealed the ruling but this was turned down.

Sutton was named outstanding player in tournaments here and at Quantico, Va., this season. He holds five Acadia club records.

Rochester Wins From Buffalo

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — Erupting for four goals in the final period, Rochester Americans whipped Buffalo Bisons 6-2 Friday night and retained first place in the American Hockey League's western division.

The Americans, winless in their last six starts, went into the game with only a one-point lead over Buffalo.

Cliff Schmautz put the Bisons ahead at 3:32 of the first period while Rochester was a man short but the Americans came back with a goal by Gerry Ehaman at 16:15 of the period.

Rookie Bruce Draper moved the Americans ahead with a goal at 7:28 of the second period, but the Bisons tied the game on Wayne Hicks' tally at 11:41.

Then came the wild third-period finish with Rochester goals by Draper at 2:41, Jim Pappin at 11:00, Alex Eaulkner at 12:30 and Ehaman at 13:43. Faulkner is from Bishop's Falls, Nfld.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont. (CP) — Memorial Gardens commissioners Friday criticized Chicago Black Hawks of the National Hockey League for not giving their farm team here enough financial support.

The commission voted to allow Sault Ste. Marie Thunderbirds to play out the remainder of the Eastern Professional Hockey League season. With the schedule half over, the commission has incurred a \$33,000 deficit. It has decided to reduce by 25 cents the price of all but the most expensive seats for the remainder of the season.

Commission Chairman Bob Thomlinson broke a 3-3 tie on whether to continue operating the Thunderbirds. A resolution asking the Black Hawks to take over operation of the Sault club by Jan. 11 was defeated.
